MONAR WINS PAL 10,000-METER HANDICAP RUN

Marcello Monar, recruit Pal runner sporting a big 10-minute handicap, steved off a brilliant home-stretch sprint by Norman Tamanaha to win Palama Settlement's 10,000-meter handicap race last Sunday morning, February 27th, leading a fine field of 13 runners to the finish. John Morales, deaf and dumb ace with an eight-minute start, finished in third place behind Tamanaha, followed by Albert Chun, who paired with Tamanaha as "scratch" men, in fourth position. Manuel Perry, with a two-minute advantage, trailed in fifth, leaving in his wake Nobriga, Ishibashi, Kaopua, Vega, Toshimi, Hajimie, Oliveira, and Suga.

For his victory, Moner was awarded a silver cup, while Tamenaha, Morales, Chun, and Perry were presented with medals by Louis Mendonca, coach of the Pal runners, immediately following the

Tamenaha made the best time for the three-lap 10,000-meter course, negotiating the distance in 35 minutes and 47 seconds. Chun traveled the route in 37:33.8, while Monar's time was 45 minutes and 40 seconds.

The races started on Vineyard street, opposite the settlement administration building, shot into Liliha, to School, up Houghtailing, and into Vineyard, finishing at the starting mark. Following were the individual handicaps and times of each runner.
