# PALAMA BOWS TO KAMAMALU IN BOXING SMOKER

Eddie Townsend's Kamamalu A.C. amateur boxers scored a 6-4 victory over Palama Settlement's team, coached by Dr. Jacob Ing and Peter Navarro, Monday, December 4, in the greatest smoker ever staged in the Settlement ring.

A packed house saw Louis Freitas, former St. Patrick feather ace, decision Palama's pride, David Roman, in a slashing lighweight battle. Superior ring generalship and experience proved to be the deciding factor in Freitas' triumph as the sensational Winged "P" novice carried the fight to the Kamamalu star.

Daniel Borero of Palama stamped himself the finest feather ever to lace on a pair of gloves at the Settlement by winning from veteran Joe Sueoka in a great exhibition. Wallace Murakami of Kamamalu scored a decision over Freddy Dela Rosa in the only flyweight bout of the sizzling 12-fight card. John Shiraishi, Kamamalu feather, made a brilliant comeback to the amateur fistic wars after a long lay-off by whipping Ken Miyashiro in a close fight Shiraishi landed cleaner punches and was the aggressor throughout the mix.

Masaji Kawasugi of Kamamalu kayoed Smiling Cannon with one punch early in the first round with a right to the jaw in a featherweight scrap. Cannon was counted out on one knee. Amaro Medeiros, Kamamalu bantam, clicked with a first round TKO victory over Richard Sakai. Medeiros displayed a two fisted attack and swarmed all over Sakai, causing Referee Walter Cho to stop the fight

stop the fight.

Dan Aquiar, Unattached, was awarded a victory over George Ferreira of Kamamalu on a foul in the third round of a bruising middleweight bout. Ferreira was leading on points when he fouled Aquiar in a body exchange. Aquiar made a big hit with the fans with his ruggedness and game stand against a better boxer.

Moses Martinez of Palama decisioned Charles Kalahele in a rousing lightweight scrap which was a slugfest from start to finish. Both boys were exhausted at the end of the fight and were accorded a fine hand. Alfred Lum, Kamamalu lightweight, decisioned Cecil Lopez in another action-crammed encounter.

Leo Navarro of Palama opened the card by taking rugged George Miura in a fast featherweight match. Navarro employed a beautiful jab and a right cross to gain the verdict.
