## HARRY LEE ASSUMES DIRECTORSHIP OF PALAMA CLUB PROGRAM

Mr. Harry K. Lee, newly-appointed director of the settlement boys' club program, assumed full charge of all club activities March 1, 1938. He succeeded Mr. Floyd D. Wardell who left recently for Los Angeles after serving a year as boys' club director of Palama Settlement.

Mr. Lee is 24 years old and a graduate of the University of Hawaii, class of '36, where he majored in social science. Because of outstanding work on the Hawaii campus, Mr. Lee was selected as an exchange student to Redland University in California, during his junior year, 1934-35.

Having begun "Y" work when he was 12 years of age as a member of a Pioneer club, Mr. Lee is familiar with every phase of YMCA club activity. He was president of the University YMCA in his senior year, and has been a club leader for the past six years.

Prior to coming to Palama, Mr. Lee was connected with the Hawaii Agricultural Experiment Station, and more recently with the Commission of Public Welfare,

As his initial project, Mr. Lee has planned a supper for all club leaders of the boys' and men's division next Monday, March 14th, at 5:00 p.m. in the cafeteria for a "get-acquainted" pow-wow. Another of his aims is to establish a class in leadership for standout Palama members.
