PALAMA WINS SIXTH AROUND OAHU MARATHON RELAY

Palama Settlement regained its position as the premier marathon club in the territory Sunday, January 15, when Louis Mendenca's Winged "P" read-running stars won the sixth around-Oahu marathon relay from a brilliant field in the fast time of 8 hours, 24 minutes, 25.7 seconds for the 83-mile grind, only 2 minutes behind the record set by Waipahu in 1938. Citywide A.C. was second, more than a mile behind, followed by Kalihi Valley CYO, Waipahu Plantation, and Kahuku Flantation-CCC in the order named.

The race developed into a two-way battle between Palama and Citywide after the 32-mile mark, which was waged bitterly right into the final lap. At this point, Citywide was running some 150 yards ahead of Palama and a surprisingly strong Kalihi Valley CYO squad, a lead gained through the brilliant effort of Frank Sherwood, who had wiped the record for the lead-off assignment in sensational style. However, Rufino Vega carried the Palama banner ahead of the pack by great running, but Citywide's Bob Strohlin retrieved the advantage with a record-smashing accomplishment. Kalihi Valley CYO was left far behind as Citywide and Palama began to turn on the heat. The orange-jerseyed Citywiders held Strohlin's margin until Albert Chun nipped Jenkins to give Rocha a small lead at Waihiawa. Rocha increased the distance slightly to give Paul Torres a 25-yard start over Citywide at the next change station as the Pal contingent went wild.

Torres became the toast of the Westside stable by turning in a spectacular piece of running at this critical stage of the race to give Palama a half-mile advantage. He was the real climax runner of the day, producing when the chips were down. Scenting victory for the first time in three years, the Pals fought frenziedly to maintain Torres' lead and succeeded in glorious fashion.

More than 15,000 people witnessed the classic, which was easily the greatest yet staged. Large and highly partisan crowds caused traffic jams at Kahuku, Waialee School, Sea View Inn, Wahiawa, Ewa Junction, and at the finish line in greeting the runners. Waipahu's band came all the way from the country to entertain the huge throng gathered at the Settlement to see the finish of the race.

Eight lap records went by the boards as the greatest assemblege of marathon stars ever grouped together locally assaulted the best marks made in five years of competition. Citywide accounted for three, Palama two, Waipahu two, and Kahuku-CCC one. Sherwood (Citywide) created a new mark for lap 1, and Hirayama (Palama) cracked the record for lap 7, to inspire a sparkling quartet of performances which began on the 9th lap, when Bajadalli (Palama) clipped two seconds off Albert Chun's long-standing criteria. Strohlin and Lee (Citywide), and Duarte (Kahuku-CCC) followed this up with record-smashing feats on laps 10, 11, and 12 respectively. Waipahu's Nigre broke the standard for the 16th assignment by more than a minute, and Gouveia erased Tamanaha's mark for the anchor lap to brighten Waipahu's dismal showing to a considerable degree.

Handsome trophies were presented to all five teams immediately following the race by Dr. Philip S. Platt, director of the Settlement. Dr. Platt congratulated the teams and their coaches for finishing the grind in such fine shape, and also the record breakers. The heartfelt thanks of the Settlement were given all officials and others who helped to make the event the success it was.

Members of the championship Palama team and the order in which they ran were Manuel Perry, Sawai, Morales, Tanaka, Hironaka, Hooper, Hirayama, Vega, Bajadalli, Robello, Suga, Kozawa, Alameda, DeLuize, Chun, Rocha, Torres, Kaopua, Muraoka, and Norman Tamanaha. Morales and Suga are deaf and dumb mutes, but they wrote their names down in the Pal record books through sheer "guts."
