PALAMA BRANCH LIBRARY

July 15, 1937 marks the second anniversary of the opening of the Branch Library in Palama Settlement. In late June of this year the Boys' Department of Palama Settlement very generously moved out of their game rooms and offices so that the Library might have larger quarters in which to more adequately serve the growing number of library borrowers. Partitions were removed and the room newly decorated, new shelving and reading tables were installed and on Saturday, July 3d the library was opened in this large pleasing room.

From July 15, 1935 to June 30, 1937 the Boys and Girls of Palama District have read 66,964 books and the Adults have read 17,093 books. There are 1998 Boys and

Girls who have library cards and 377 Adults.

Besides supplying recreational reading and books to aid in school work the library has provided books, pamphlets and magazines to answer such questions as:

"What questions must I be able to answer to become a citizen of the U. S.?"

"How were feather capes made by the early Hawaiians".

"I wish to take a civil service examination, are there any books that will help me?"

"Is there a recent book about secretarial work?"

"What is the correct way to answer this invitation?"

Then too there was the sewing teacher who found just the pattern she needed in a government bulletin and the boy who found the information needed about sugar making so he could prepare and exhibit. There are several children who are too young to have library cards of their own but whose mothers come in regularly to borrow books to read to thom.
