# SETTLEMENT 1938 STATISTICAL REPORT OUT

Dr. Philip S. Platt's statistical report on the activities of Palama Settle ment for the year 1938 has made its appearance in attractive pamphlet form, and is ready for distribution.

The report emerges clean-cut and intelligible from a pyramid of statistics compiled by heads of all the departments at the Settlement - and is a great work.

In its 15 years as a welfare center, the Settlement has grown and progressed with such tremendous strides that today, it is the heart-throb of Palama district. Last year, Palama Settlement served 50,000 people, with 682,682 services listed in the files of the Medical Department, Medical Social Service Division, Public Health Nursing Department, Children's Dental Clinic, Recreation Department, Vacation Camp, and the Palama Branch Library of Hawaii.

The far-reaching extent of the wonderful work that is being carried on by the Settlement cannot be fully realized nor its magnitude appreciated without looking into its departments. The 1938 statistical report tells the story of a great social agency stretching every means to serve a number of people far beyond its capacity. There are seven urgent needs, amounting to \$32,000 to be met, and Palama invites special gifts, large or small, as permanent memorials to the public spirit and vision of their donors. The needed improvements are:

- 1. Vacation Camp Repairs
- 2. Nine Additional Clubrooms
- 3. Outdoor Basketball, Volleyball, and Handball Courts
- 4. Gymnasium Annex

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- 5. Enlargement of Small Boys' Game-room
- 6. Separate Clubrooms for Adult Men
- 7. Improvements to Palama Buildings and Grounds

The statistical report, commemorating Palama Settlement's forty-third year of community service, was mimeographed at Palama by Mrs. Julia Desha, with Mercantile Printing Company supplying the cover.

# PAL INVITATION SWIM MEET SCHEDULED FRIDAY

Palama Settlement's second annual Invitational Swimming Meets will be staged this Friday, May 5, and next Thursday, May 11, at 7:30 p.m. in the Settlement tank, with top performers from Central Y.M.C.A., Nuuanu Y.M.C.A., University of Hawaii, Citywide A.A., and Palama battling for honors.

Trials are scheduled for Wednesday, May 3, and Tuesday, May 9, at 7:30 p.m.

Harvey Chilton's Hui Makani splashers, winners of the 1938 event, will not defend their championship and a spectacular scramble for the title looms.

A beautiful trophy will be awarded the club scoring the highest total points over both meets, and medals will be presented to the man, woman, boy, and girl swimmer scoring the highest number of points in their respective divisions. Individual winners in all events will receive ribbons.

A 16-event program is scheduled for the May 5 meet, while the May 11 splash will offer 14 races. Swimmers will be limited to three events and one relay, or two events and two relays.

#### FAVORITES WIN IN COMMUNITY SLAM TUSSLES

Tai Loy Ho's defending-champion Kakaako Sons and the powerful Kakaako slam outfit continued to dominate play in Palama Settlement's Community Volleyball league by chalking up their third consecutive victories last week in the Westside gym.

Kakaako downed a surprisingly tough Kalihi Pharmacy crew after three hard-fought sets in the feature game of a twinattraction Tuesday evening, April 25, behind fine slamming by Shodahl, Huihui, and Peterson. Scores were 16-14, 15-17, and 15-9. Keliikoa starred for the Pharmacists. Maggie's Inn pounded out an easy 15-3, 15-7 win over the inexperienced Puerto Rican Independent Club in the other game.

Kakaako Sons smashed Damon A.C. in straight sets 15-9, 15-2 in the opening tussle of Thursday's double-bill. Saint John handed Elders Club a 16-14, 6-15, 15-6 shell-lacking to lower the curtain on the third week's schedule. Char and Diamond scintillated for St. John with fine offensive play, while Abili, Sing, and Kupahu starred for the Elders.

Twin-bills are scheduled this Tuesday and Thursday evenings in the gym, with the first tilts slated to go on at 7:00.

Meheula came through with a blue ribbon in the High Jump, the final event on the program, enabling the Pals to win by a single point. Palama was leading by the margin of only two points when the High Jump was called, needing a first place to cinch the meet, and Meheula delivered in dramatic fashion.

# INTER-CLUB TRACK CHAMPIONS CROWNED SAT.

Sylvester Abili's Castle Club and Raymond Choo's Hui Aliis were/crowned Senior and Junior division champions of Palama Settlement's first Inter-club Track and Field meet Saturday, April 29, at Kamehameha field. Castle Club chalked up 115 points and Hui Alii 56 digits to gain their victories.

The Castles dominated the Senior bracket by copping 11 first places out of a possible 18. Bob Vieira's Junior Helpers finished in second position with 44 markers, followed by the Governors with 33 digits.

Black Hawks trailed in second place behind Hui Alii in the Junior division by scoring 27 points, leaving in their wake Elephants with 23, Cub Pack #10 with 22, and Flaming Arrows and Ravens with 14 tallies apiece.

Standout performance of the meet was Meheula's 5'8" Unlimited High Jump.
