King Football made his bow attired in a colorful jersey and dungaree pants before crowds estimated at more than ten thousand rabid fans Sunday, September 10, as the 1939 Citywide-Palama 130# barefoot league opened its season with six slashing games on rural and city gridirons.

A scrappy Charlie Chan outfit coached by "Ducky" Swan, former Dayton University ace, gave shoeless football followers the day's biggest thrill by scoring a brilliant 6-3 upset over the defending-champion Aiea Rams. The country lads were heavy pre-season favorites to repeat, but a recovered fumble by Charlie Chan on the Aiea 20-yard stripe in the third quarter splashed the dope sheet. Aiea gained an early lead when Nadai kicked a field goal from the seven-yard line in the first quarter.

Masuto Fujii's powerful Kyodo Kai machine crushed a hard-hitting but green Pal Babes combination 27-0 at Castle field, in a tussle featured by the spectacular ball-toting of Kyodo's Tomita brothers, Tongo and Maha, and the vicious tackling of Jimmy Koo, Pal Babes halfback.

Ewa registered a mild upset by crushing Akebono Kai 13-0 at Ewa to blanket West Section openers.

Loo's Place, East Section favorite, nearly caught a tartar in Waialae YMA, but managed to squeeze out a 7-6 victory behind the dangerous Louis Freitas-Kimball Yap passing combination. Trailing 6-0 into the final period, Freitas whipped a 40-yard pass to Yap for a touchdown. Yap converted from placement for the winning margin.

Moililli Nesei scored a surprisingly easy 15-0 triumph over Lido Cafe, while Smile Cafe encountered little difficulty in thumping Hui Makai 19-0 in the remaining East Section games.
