PALS THIRD IN RAINBOW RELAY CARNIVAL

Winged "P" cinder artists, AAU track and field champions, breezed into third position in the annual Rainbow Relay Carnival behind the University of Hawaii and Citywide A.A., Saturday afternoon, May 28th, at Alexander Field. Scores were; University of Hawaii 95, Citywide 76, Palema 55, and Waimenalo 23.

The Pels garnered four blue ribbons in a meet featured by the brilliant running of Charley Ornellas, veteran ace and coach of the Westside squad. Ornelas practically won two relays for Palama, his 50-yard advantage as first man in the four-mile relay being the margin of victory, and his fine anchor lap in the medley event made up a 10-yard deficit to defeat a fine field.

Howard Fernandez was a surprise winner in the broad-jump, while Smaller came through in spectacular fashion in the javelin throw.

INTER CLUB BOXING SMOKER DATE ADVANCED

The first Inter-Club Boxing Tournament, originally scheduled for this Friday, June 3rd, has been postponed until Thursday, June 9th, to give the boys more time to round into condition. Entries will close with Mr. Harry Lee at 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, June 8.

A beautiful gold trophy, now on display in the Settlement show-case, will be presented to the winning club. Contrary to previous announcements, this trophy will be a perpetual award instead of a permenent one.

Fighters will be classified under five weight divisions, 80, 95, 110, 125, and 140 pounds, and must scale in on the day of the tournament. This gives the small boys as much chance to score points for their club as their larger pals. Teams, however, will be limited to five entries, probably necessitating intra-club tryouts

All bouts will be fought under the Queensbury rules of boxing, with 14 ounce mitts. Three two-minute rounds will be required off 110, 125, and 140 pound battlers, while the 80 and 95 pounders will throw gloves for three one-minute stanzas.

Big interest is being shown in the forthcoming ring fiests, several clubs holding nightly sparring sessions in the Settlement ring. Gloves are available to all groups by request.

Fil Marvin, director of the smoker and match-maker, has worked out an ingenuous scoring system designed to give all clubs equal chances to win the trophy regardless of size, weight, or ability. Points will be awarded on the following basis:

300 points for a Decision
250 " " " Technical KO
200 " " " KO
150 " " " Draw
50 " " Team Entry
(Win or Lose)

Teams should note however, that 50 points will be deducted for a forfeit, which means that a club will lose 100 points by so doing.

Mr. Marvin is making arrangements to secure the services of a prominent local fighter as referee, and promises a colorful and sizzling show of Palama boxing talent.
