PALAMA SWAMPS SANTA BARBARA IN RADIO MEET

Palama Settlement's youthful squad of all-round athletes buried the cream of Santa Barbara youngsters under an avalanche of points and scintillating performances, Saturday afternoon April 3, to win the first annual "radio" athletic meet between the two institutions by a record score. The final count read Palama Settlement $254\frac{3}{4}$; Santa Barbara Boys' Club $50\frac{1}{4}$.

White-washing the Californians in 16 events, the Pals outscored Santa Barbara in 32 of the 35 events listed in the carnival; dropping only the 200 yard shuttle sprint relay and the Pull-Ups to their rivals in the 80# class, and the latter contest in the 95# division. The Settlement 110# team hung up the most impressive record for Palama by sweeping all places in the pentathlon and the two special attractions. Winged P 125 and 140 pounders also tallied heavily in every event, while the 80 and 95 pound classes more than held their own.

The most sensational individual performance of the day was registered by James Koo, Pal 125 pound ace. The Korean lad thrilled the local contingent by swishing the nets 28 times without a miss in the one-minute basket shoot for a brilliant all-time all-Palama record. Sparkling exhibitions were also staged by James Kong who hop, step, and jumped 27' 1" and cleared the high jump cross-bar at 5' 6", Francis Sing with 25 baskets and 41 Pull-Ups, Albert Abellana in the High Jump, and Issac Lum in the Broad Jump.

The Trans-Pacific competition was conducted via radio messages coded by radio amateurs of both cities. Sgt. Brown and his Schofield corps handled the local end of the meet in wonderful fashion without a hitch. Every message sent by the dough-boys were revelations in skill, smoothness, and efficiency. Thanks:, Buddies.

Close on the heels of the "radic" meet will come the annual Boys Clubs of America indoor athletic pentathlon which embraces the same events on the program, a standing broad jump, standing hop, step and jump, running high jump, one-minute basketball shoot, and a Pull-Up. Palama Settlement was national champion in 1932, 1933, and 1934, but failed to extend the winning streak in ensuing years when third place was the best she could manage. However, Settlement champions continued to carve high niches in the individual honor roll, averaging two national winners in every competition. The Pals will be woefully weak in the lighter weight divisions this year, with young and inexperienced representatives to bank upon, but several of them are expected to blaze brilliant records nationally. Marks registered by boys under 18 years of age in the "radio" pentathlon will count in the B.C.A. finals which is slated to be held within the next two weeks.

The B.C.A. Swimming pentathlon will also be staged during April. This competition is open to boys who have not yet reached their twenty-first birthdays.

MR. HARRY HETTEMA ON "TALKS"

Mr. Harry Hettema, whose philosophy of living is the ideal of more than one Palama member, returned to the Settlement auditorium last Sunday morning, April 4, and gave an inspiring talk on "Talks" to the Pal Club.

Addressing the assembly as one man, Mr. Hettema pointed out the foolishness of thinking that wisdom can be bought. He enumerated the four things which are "free" and yet are essential requirements of a successful man -- Honesty, Integrity, Punctuality, and Initiative. Mr. Hettema cited four instances where "talks" by men left their impressions upon him, among which are Teddy Roosevelt's speech, the philosophy of a great Dutchman, and a Carolina governor's comparison a bundle of soiled, filthy rags, and a cleareyed healthy youngster after putting them both through respective mills. The rags will emerge clean, white, and beautiful in the form of writing paper, while the human being becomes a derelict after going through the "gin" mill.

Mr. Hettema left with the Pals a cleancut picture of how far a man can go without the aid of an education if he follows the doctrines of Honesty, Integrity, Punctuality, and Initiative. Palama members will not soon forget his mastery of words, his eloquence, and the beauty and simplicity of his philosophy of living.

Harry Hettema's talk on "Living Memorials" in 1934, and his "Trees" in 1936 are unforgettable gems which has remained with Palama youth.

Gold awards were presented to members of the boxing team by Mr. Wood, director of the boys' and men's department. Take-ji Maruya and Thomas King received medals for their fine records, while Walter Chowas honored for coaching the Pal boxers.

These youngster, together with the old standbys, Tomita, Lum, Souza, Tamanaha, Manuel DeMello, Carriera, Dolan, Phillips, and Vasconcellos, will bear the Maroon colors during the 1937 season.

Settlement junior cinderpath burners will have opportunities to display their talents when the Junior Republic Relay Carnival, April 17th, and the American Legion Track and Field Championships on April 24th, are staged.

The Junior trackfests are open to any person who has not scored a point in a major track meet exclusive of relays and special events.
