WHAT RESULT ARMISTICE

Nearly twenty years have passed since the Allics and the Central Powers agreed on an armistice which lifted the war clouds from Flanders' fields and silenced booming guns which had raged for four disastrous years. The Big Struggle has been popularly referred to as the "war to end wars". Uncle Sam tossed his men, money, and munitions into the breach to "make the world safe for democracy."

Wild jubilation followed the armistice truce, and people everywhere were convinced that future conflicts between civilized nations of the world will not be fought with arms and on battlefields. November 11th became an international holiday among the Allied countries, a day celebrating the close of the darkest page in modern history.

The greatest statesmen of 1920 erred in drawing up the Peace Treaty of Versailles. It was essentially a "victory" treaty - the main purpose of which was to divide the spoils of war and to humble Germany beyond the hope of recovery. Such a move could not be tolerated by a race with the proud blood of the original freeman flowing in their voins.

War thunder is rumbling today in the Far East, and its ominous message is threatening to sweep the world into another maelstrom of death and destruction far exceeding the Tholesale butchery of humans in 1914. Perhaps it is Destiny, but we cannot overlook the fact that the Treaty of Versailles which followed the Armistice of 1918 is largely responsible for the present situation. Landhungry Japan, disillusioned Italy, trempled Germany, are demanding their pound of flesh, and somebody has to pay.

BASKETBALL HITTING STRIDE AT PALAMA

Basketball is holding sway as the chief athletic interest at Palama Settlement with the exit of King Football as the dominant attraction. However, the shoeless Monarch will return in all his splendor for a brief interlude when the Pal Juniors, Oahu 140# champions, play the Maui County titlists for the territorial crown.
