U. gymnastic championship by defeating a star-studded field in the five-event apparatus competition held last Wednesday evening, May 31, in the Palama gym. A big crowd saw Kobayashi gain the all-round title in convincing fashion.

N. Deuring of Central YMCA was second, followed by Yoshito Sagawa of Nuuanu YMCA, and P. Freeman of Maui. R. Bentley of Maui copped the Novice Tumbling title for men, while Mildred Hoshino of Palama won the girls' honor for the event with teammate Helen Lum second.

Compulsory exercises in tumbling, horizontal tar, side-horse, flying rings, and parallels were required off all contestants. Kobayashi won individual championships in all events except the parallels, where a slip cost him a clean sweep.

Gymnastic stars from the University of Hawaii and the Salvation Army were also entered in the meet.

PALS SECOND IN B.C.A. SWIMMING COMPETITION


