VASQUEZ WINS BCA NATIONAL 125# TITLE

Stephen Vasquez, 17-year old Palama youth of Mexican ancestry, was named B.C.A. national 125# champion at the 32nd Annual Conference of Boys' Clubs of America, in Chicago, according to a cable gram received by Dr. Platt from Mr. Wilber Wood, recreation director and Settlement delegate to the conference.

Dope that Palama Settlement finished in eighth place in the indoor track pentathlon, and fifth position in swimming were also given.

In winning the national chempionship, Vasquez registered consistently fine merks in every event of the pentathlon. He broad-jumped 8'2", hop, step and jumped 23'8", high-jumped 5'5", hoisted his chin over a cross-ber 42 times, and rung the bell for 22 baskets. will be awarded a beautifully designed medal symbolic of the national championship, and another medal for winning the Palama 125# title. Suenaga, 80 pounds, Lee, 95 pounds, Shirohama, 110 pounds, and Meheula, Unlimited, round out the Pal chempions They will also receive standard/medals.

PALS WIN AAU TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Marcon and White' senior spikesters coached by Charley Ornellas and Fil Marvin won the 1938 A.A.U. track and field championships held Saturday, May 21st, at Alexander Field, by scoring 52½ points, nosing out the University of Hawaii with 51, Citywide A.A. with 48, and Waimarale with 34½.

Citywide A.A., with its brilliant array of Army stars, had the meet virtually in the bag after the half-mile relay, the final event on the program, had been run. However, the winning Citywide team was disqualified when its third man over-ran his passing zone, giving the University of Hawaii quartet first place, and enabling the third place Winged "P" baton-passers to move up a notch and clinch the meet. The score-board prior to the epoch-making relay read Palama 40½, Citywide 48, and University of Hawaii 46.

Charley Ornellas and George Lee were the individual stars for Palama, both of them double-winners. Ornellas won the quarter-mile run from a fine field in 52.5 and the 880 yard run in 2:03.8, while Lee stopped the watches at 9.9 for the hundred, and broad-jumped 22'64" for another blue ribbon.
