FRANKIE'S CAB WINS PALAMA BASEBALL TITLE

Coach Jack Hewison's slugging Frankie's Cab outfit won the 1939 Palama Community Baseball championship by crushing Pink Elephant Inn 20-0 in the play-off for the league title Sunday morning, April 2, at Castle field. The massacre erased all doubts concerning Frankie's Cab supremacy.

Frankie's Cab stampeded the Pink Elephants in the sixth inning by scoring six runs on four hits and erratic fielding on the part of the opposition. The taxi-cab crew had tallied four runs in the second chapter on three safeties, and the splurge just about cracked the Pink Elephant morale. Frankie's Cab piled up the score by registering 10 more runs in the final three frames.

Moniz limited Pink Elephant Inn to four measly and well-scattered hits, while his team-mates collected 15 off Gunderson and Bernard. Vause, Frankie's Cab center-fielder, garnered hitting laurels by smashing out three safeties in five attempts. Ferreira and Custino connected safely three times in six trips to the plate.

Frankie's Cab was awarded a silver statuette symbolic of the championship immediately following the tussle.
