They also enjoyed musical entertainment, carnival games, bobbing for doughnuts, and a traditional Halloween costume contest. #### **Greetings from our Executive Director**



2002 is rapidly coming to a close! For all of us at Palama this has been a challenging and busy year. The aftermath of 9/11 has made it difficult for many individuals, businesses, and social service agencies. At Palama we were faced with a decrease in funding,

loss of staff, and an increase in the demand for services. I am proud to say that our Board of Trustees and staff rose to the challenge!

- The first task we faced was to cut our expenses. This meant eliminating some positions and not filling others that were vacant. Secondly, we needed to handle the increase in families asking for help and the dramatic rise in the number of youth participating in our programs. Through creative staffing we not only avoided cutting back on programs but we actually increased our services. Credit goes to our dedicated and committed staff who doubled-up on responsibilities, worked longer hours, and scheduled additional intramural activities for our community.
- Furthermore, our administrative staff pitched in and assumed some of the duties performed by staff who had retired or resigned. By sharing responsibilities and *working together as a team*, we were able to keep activities and programs running smoothly.
- Thirdly, our Board of Trustees undertook the challenge of raising additional funds for Palama by organizing our first **Palama Settlement Charity Golf Tournament** held in August. The tournament committee, co-chaired by trustees **Donna Mercado Kim** and **Bob Wu**, worked extremely hard and raised approximately \$48,000 for Palama.
- Our special thanks to our underwriting sponsor *First Hawaiian Bank* and our contributing sponsors--the *Laborers' Union, Local 368 and Verizon Hawaii*--for their generous donations. Mahalo also to our Board President *Glenn Kimura* for his steadfast support of the tournament and all the sponsors and participants who contributed to making the event a phenomenal success. We hope the tournament will become another proud Palama tradition.
- I also want to recognize and thank our *Palama Manor Task Force Committee*, chaired by *Richard Lau*, for renegotiating the rental lease for our Palama Manor property. The major part of the additional income will be utilized for vital capital improvements for our aging buildings, facilities, and grounds. A limited amount of the funds will be used to support emerging programs.
- Finally, we were blessed this year with *unexpected support* from the community in the form of generous grants and donations from individuals, foundations, and businesses. We've also received the help of many volunteers from our military community, the Grace Bible Church of Honolulu, Hawaiian Building Maintenance, the Honolulu Lions Club, our teen clubs, parents in our various recreational programs, and others who have given unselfishly of their time and talents.
- What looked like a dismal year has turned out to be a truly exciting and fruitful year! This was all accomplished through a *community of people and institutions working together*. We are now looking forward to hosting our final event for 2002, our annual *Christmas concert* on December 14.

Our thanks to all of you for your gifts of aloha that sustain our work through the year. Have a joyous and safe holiday season!

## Palama offers horsemanship program

alama is the place to be if you enjoy sports. Besides the usual activities of football, basketball, volleyball, soccer, cheerleading, and swimming, Palama is introducing the sport of equestrianism <aka horseback riding> to our young people this year. Working with the Hawaii Equestrian Foundation and the Koko Crater Equestrian Center, we have started a program to develop horsemanship among youth particularly those who come from at-risk communities like Kalihi-Palama.

What will our youth gain from this program? In addition to learning how to ride and handle a horse, the goals of the program include helping youngsters to:

- Develop empathy and compassion for horses and other animals
  - Learn to care for animals
- Become aware of their bodies, learn body control, and develop their reflexes
- Focus on a task and persevere in reaching their goals
- Build self-esteem by learning new skills
- Develop personal responsibility and work as a team with others

The equestrian program will be incorporated into our *Pakolea Sports/ Academic Program* and will thus include an emphasis on the youths' educational progress. Participants will take riding classes at the Koko Crater Equestrian Center and will also be required to attend our *Learning Center* for tutoring and homework assignments.

The Hawaii Equestrian Foundation and the Koko Crater Equestrian Center will be underwriting the major cost of the initial program. The Foundation will be writing grants to fund the program in the
