LAKIMELA NIP PAL AMATEURS IN CRUCIAL MIX ASSUMES LEAD IN PAL BALL LOOP

Coach "Lefty" Okazaki's high-riding Lakimela ball-tossers scored a brilliant 4-3 victory over the defending-champion Palama Amateurs to assume undisputed leadership of Palama Settlement's Community Baseball League, last Sunday morning at Castle Field, Palama, in the first game of a scheduled triple-bill. Caliente Club crashed the win column for the first time this season by repelling the Rebels 13-6 in the second game at 1:00 p.m., while the Crusaders took the Pal Ramblers into camp 9-5 at 3:00 p.m. to complete the third week's schedule.

A big second inning, when they manufactured three runs on four hits, gave the Lakimelas a strangle hold on the ball game. Palama Amateurs registered their runs in the third, fifth, and sixth stanzas, but failed to overcome the one-run advantage tallied by Lakimela in the third inning. Akutagawa scored twice for the winners.

By virtue of their scintillating win, Lakimela gained a clear shot at the title, Caliente Club and the Crusaders being their remaining obstacles. Both of these aggregations have lost one or more games, and should furnish but little competition for the slugging Lakimela crew.

PALS PREPARE FOR PENTATHLON COMPEITS

Sparkling performances have been registered by Palama Settlement's youthful all-round athletes as training sessions for the Palama-Santa Barbara radio pentathlon, which is tentatively scheduled for Saturday afternoon, April 3rd, and the B.C.A. indoor track meet against Boys' Clubs on the Mainland, begin hitting their high peaks in turn-outs.

The most brilliant marks hung up after two of weeks of practice are Archie Kapahua's 26 baskets in one minute, and Francis Sing's 9' 4" broad-jump. Veterans of former championship winged P squads are very much in evidence at the conditioning periods, and if reputations mean anything, the Westside club should take Santa Barbara in convincing style.

Palama Settlement will be woefully weak in the lightweight divisions, the 80 and 95 pound classes, but the wealth of material in the 110, 125, and 140 pound brackets should swing the tide. The 140 lb. division loom as the most powerful in the Pal team, boasting a star-studded line-up in Henry Hu, Francis Sing, Archie Kapahua, Harry Chung, and James Kong, athletes of proven worth. Elmo Tomita, Kenneth Wong, James Koo, and Henry Choy are the best bets in the 125 pound class, while James Lam, John Lum, Ah Wah Lum, and Albert Choy will be standard bearers in the 110 pound section.
