Favored by many followers of the league to win, the McCully cagers failed to locate the baskets during the entire game, missing set-ups repeatedly, while the B.K.Y. sharp-shooters were connecting spectacularly and consistently.

The and K. Ito led the offense of the champions, scoring ll and 8 points respectively. Ito was also a bear on defense, stopping McCully threats time and again. One with seven points, Ishizaki with six, and Maetani with digits were the best shots for McCully.
