Palama Settlement's Community 135# cagers were featured in a five-game attraction Sunday, November 27, as the league slid through its third round of play in the Settlement gymnasium. One close contest and two wild-scoring tussles marked the day's activities as pre-season favorites toppled their opposition convincingly.

Heoji Kumashiro's defending-champion McInerny Monarchs swarmed all over the Leaders 76-12 in the highest-scoring game yet played in the Fal gym. The Monarchs scored at will and shot the Leaders dizzy as Mahukona rang up 25 points, followed by Silva with 19, and Sawai with 12.

Castle A.C. threatened McInerny's mark by slaughtering Akepo Lane 68-15 behind fine shooting by Scharsch and Weheula. Scharsch dumped in 19 points, while Meheula connected for 16.

Tommy Wong's Pirates nipped the Mavericks 27-25 in the best game of the morning. The Mavericks, playing way above their heads, led all the distance until the closing moments when the more experienced Pirates applied the pressure to win. Kam, Maverick center, chalked up 10 points for high-scoring honors. Ja, a team-mate, registered seven, while R. Chun of the Pirates accounted for six. Ja's sparkling PALS SINK USS BEAVER 33-27 IN Jh. The Riversiders continued to play top notch ball to dump McCully 26-12 for their third straight victory. Shinto sparked the Riversider offense with 10 points, and was accorded fine support by Yomono, who scored six.

PAL MARATHONERS ANTICIPATE BANNER SEASON

Coach Louis Mendonca's Palama marathon team is entertaining high hopes of sweeping all major events in the local roadrunning season which will unofficially open with the Palama Handicap run Sunday, December 18.

The Pals boast their strongest line-up in years, and are confident of both team and individual victories in the 15th Annual Diamond Head five-mile run on January 2, and the Sixth Around-Oahu Marathon Relay classic on January 15.

Mendonca is banking on a star-studded crew to make good Palama's threat to cop all the big marathon events of the year. Striding in the key position of the Pal stable will be Norman Tamanaha, veteran Westside ace, and one of Hawaii's two truly great marathoners. Tamanaha has never finished worse than third in the Diamond Head Run over a span of six years. Backing Tamanaha are Albert Chun, Burton Hooper, Al DeLuize, and Manuel Perry, stars who have proven their mettle over sunscorched pavements, and a score of lesser lights whose names will be reckoned with before the season closes. Palama's possibilities soered with the signing of William Badjadali and Mitsuo Hironaka of Waialua recently. Badjadali was the kingpin of the Waialua relay team which disbanded last year, while Hirnonaka is a fine runner.

Members of the Palama Around-Oahu team will be selected on the basis of performance in the Pal Handicap and Diamond Head runs. Mendonca has made the announcement that all runners must compete in both races to qualify for selection.

Coach Fillmore Marvin's Winged "P" cagers, defending Junior ASUH champions, scored an impressive 33-27 victory over a rangy USS Beaver squad in their first showing of the season last Wednesday evening at the University of Hawaii gym.

James Koo was the big gun for the Pals, tallying 10 points. Captain Sylvester Abili was a standout at guard besides tossing in his share of baskets. Yen Chun Ching, Elmo Tomita, and Don Chatterton were other bright lights for Palama.

The Pals will meet University "A" this Thursday at 8:45 p.m. in the University of Hawaii gym.
