Both Preschools began with a joint-parent meeting on Sept. 6, 1966 at 7:30 p.m., at the Kaumakapili Parish Hall. There were more than fifty parents--both Fathers and Mothers and about fifteen children, who were present.

The Mistress of Ceremonies was Mrs. Carole Hochfelson. First on the program was the Welcome Address, then following it was a colored movie that was shown. After it slides were shown also. These movies and slides were the Preschooler, both from Harris and Palama that were taken last year during the excursions. All the parents enjoyed seeing these colored movies and slides.

Mrs. Ching's projector failed at the moment, so Mr. Amodo Rodrigues, who is father of preschooler, Wayne Scott came to the rescue. He went home to get his projector. (Thank you Mr. Rodrigues.)

Mrs. Inouye filled the time by community singing. The Staff from Palama and Harris were introduced. Teacher Director for Palama Preschool is Mrs. Carole Hochfelson. Assistant Teacher is Mrs. Ruby Kaneao. Teacher Director for Harris preschool are Mrs. Inouye and Mrs. Aileen Ching. Assistant Teachers are Mrs. Marie Kapoi and Mrs. Ellen Cannon. Both teachers gave short talks on "What the School Programs were about."

On Sept. 6-14--Teachers, Assistant Teachers and social worker made home visits. Sept. 14-29, there was a gradual orientation in small groups. Both schools operate on all day basis. Schedule is from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. with snacks and hot lunch provided besides their daily preschool activities.

"PALAMA-HARRIS PRESCHOOL WORKSHOP" Look-See-Do Party

On Sept. 29, 1966, at Palama Community Preschool, we had a look-see-do party involving both Palama and Harris preschool parents to attend.

We started off by having Mrs. Ching and Mrs. Hochfelson introduce the parents. Their names, how many children they had and what school or preschool they attended. Our guests were Rev. Bonsey, Mrs. Stella Juan (Head teacher) and Mrs. Lucy Namohoe (Assist. teacher) both from Linapuni school at Kuhio Park Terrace (89-10 preschool.) Mrs. Elsie Chock (Head teacher) and Mrs. Shiroma (Assist. teacher) both from Lanakila (89-10 preschool.)

After introductions were made, we formed three groups. The first group went into the easel and finger painting room. The second group went into the block building, reading, supermarket and musical room. The third group went into the doll corner or play room.

Our group started off by going into the easel and finger painting room. Mrs. Marie Kapoi taught us how to mix wheat paste with water, until thick adding your own color of powder paint. After laying the paper flat on the table (be sure to damp paper first) we scoopped some paste on the paper and used our fingers to areate our own artistic work. Some did easel painting.

Next we went into the block building room. Mrs. Incure explained to us the uses of the blocks. A child learns the shapes, sizes, balance, numbers, height, weight and space. Development of large and small muscles. It also creates expression—including talking about it.

The reading room was very expressive, where a child can learn a lot by just looking thru the pictures in the books. Mrs. Hochfelson told us that a child can learn the difference between make-believe and what is real (and enjoy both). They also learn new words and also enjoys hearing stories told to them. They also have a small supermarket where they learn to buy things by looking at the pictures on the labels of cans, jars or boxes.

They learn to sing and play music. Here are some of their instruments. Triangle, symbol, bells, tambounia, jingle stick and rythem sticks.

In the doll corner, children like to pretend that they are grown-ups. They have dolls, dishes utensils, clothes, hats, purses and shoes for playing house. They learn objects in the doll corner-things that are also in the home.

Next we learned how to make play dough. Here is the recipe (for small amount) $\frac{1}{2}$ cup flour, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup table salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup water. Drops of **XXXXXX** food color until you get color desired. Add flour if dough is doo wet. Put away in plastic bag. Keep in refrigerator. Will last one month.

Afterwards we had refreshments, cake and juice. Workshop adjournment at 9:30 p.m.

All in all I thought it was a very wonderful experience and everyone had fun learning. Now I know why our children likes to go to preschool.
