EDDIE LUM WINS NATIONAL B.C.A. 110# TITLE

Eddie Lum, conscientious 16-year old Chinese athlete, is the toast of the Palama Boys' Club today following an announcement from B.C.A. headquarters in New York that he is the national 110# champion in the Indoor Athletic Pentathlon competition.

Included in the dispatch was the information that Palama finished in third place in the Swimming Pool Competition. Reports that the local boys' club was fifth in the Indoor Athletic Pentathlon are yet to be confirmed officially. Palama Settlement placed second and eighth in the respective competitions last year.

In gaining the national 110# title, Lum duplicated the performance of his elder brother, Ah Wah, who achieved the signal honor in 1936. Comparative records show the brothers to be almost evenly matched in their winning years. Eddie registered marks of 8' 6" in the Broad Jump, 22' 9½" in the Hop, Step & Jump, 5' 1½" in the High Jump, 23 Baskets in one minute; and 23 Pull-Ups, as compared to Ah Wah's 8' 9 3/8", 22' 9½", 4' 10½", 23, and 31 for the same events made four years ago. Eddie will receive a specially designed medal for turning the trick.

Lum became the fifth Palama boy to win a national B.C.A. 110# championship since William Gee first crashed the column in 1932. Others were Elmo Tomita in 1933, Itsuki Oshita in 1934, and Ah Wah Lum in 1936.

Additional statistics on Palama's 1940 B.C.A. Indoor Pentathlon and Swimming Pool achievements will be published as soon as they are received.

GULICK STORE WINS PAL SLAM CHAMPIONSHIP

Gulick Store's well-balanced slam outfit won Palama Settlement's 1940 community volleyball league title by scoring a brilliant two-set victory over Fern A. C. last Thursday, June 13, in the Westside gym. Scores were 15-4 and 17-15.

The tussle was featured by long rallies and spectacular smashing and pick-ups - the scores failing to indicate the close-ness of action. "Joe Louis" Keliikoa led the Gulick offense and was backed in sterling fashion by Boyd, Gohier, and Kealoha. Ducky Swan, Diamond, and W. Char starred for Fern A. C. The victory was Gulick Store's seventh in a row and Fern's initial setback in six starts.

Gulick Store moved into the championship spot vacated by Kakaako Sons, who did not defend their title won in 1938 and 1939. For winning the championship of the eight-team league, Gulick Store was presented with a beautiful trophy by the league-manager immediately following the tussle.

INTER-CLUB SWIM MEET SCHEDULED JUNE 28

The Boys' Department's third annual Inter-Club Swimming Meet is scheduled for 7:00 p.m., Friday, June 28, in the Settlement tank. Postponed since May 17, the big splash is expected to be keener and more closely contested than any of the previous meets.

Competition will be divided into two sections - Junior (14 years and under), and Senior (over 15 years). The clubs scoring the greatest total of points in each division will be crowned Junior and Senior Inter-Club champions of 1940 respectively. Points will tally 5-3-2-1 for individual events, and 10-6-4-2 for relays.

Events listed in the swim meet are 25-yard Freestyle, Breaststroke, and Backstroke; 50-yard Freestyle, Breaststroke, and Backstroke; 100-yard Freestyle and Breaststroke; 75-yard Medley Relay, 150-yard Medley Relay, 100-yard Freestyle Relay, and 200-yard Freestyle Relay.
