

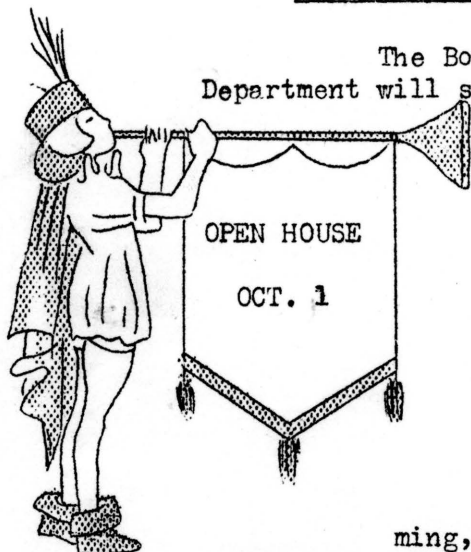

## BOYS' DIVISION TO HOLD "OPEN HOUSE" FRIDAY



The Boys' Division of Palama Settlement's Recreation Department will stage an "Open House" to the public at large this Friday evening, October 1st, from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m., the purpose of which is to demonstrate, quite informally, as many of the weekly activities as can be conveniently carried in one night so that the visiting public may get a birds-eye view of the varied types of leisure time projects conducted by the department.

It is not intended that the demonstrations take on the form of an exhibition, but instead, to present as nearly as possible, a complete representative program of routine activity showing conduct of Club, Scouting, Class, Swimming, Athletic, and Gymnastic features, all of which are a

part of the every day activity at Palama Settlement.

Exhibitions of craft projects which have been completed or are in the making, will also be on display.

Routine trips will be conducted throughout the Settlement buildings, including the lobby, recreation offices, auditorium, library, workshop, club-house, (where meetings will be in progress), swimming pool, gymnasium, and the Playground pavilion where Scout and Cub Pack units of Palama will be in session.

One Midget and one Intermediate or Junior Club will hold a regular meeting in the two club-rooms on the second floor of the boys' club-house. Midgets and Juniors will occupy the boys' game-room, Mavericks the private and senior game-rooms, Airplane Class the Workshop, Coconut-craft display in the lobby, Swim Club in the Pool, and Paddle Tennis and Badminton Classes in one section of the gymnasium, while tumblers, gymnasts, and wrestlers occupy the Ewa end of the floor.

Placards indicating the activity will be conspicuously placed. Posters and enlarged photographs will depict other activities which may or may not be in progress. The Melodeers, a dance orchestra, will hold a rehearsal in the auditorium.

All parents of Palama members, friends, and patrons of the Settlement are cordially invited and urged to attend the "Open House."

Hundreds of colorful and attractive pamphlets listing the activity program of the Boys' and Girls' Divisions of the Palama Recreation Department are ready for distribution. ## BAREFOOTERS IN SECOND WEEK OF CAMPAIGN

Thrill-packed games were dished up by West Section gridsters despite inclement weather, Sunday, September 26, as the Citywide-Palama barefoot leagues swung into their second of hostility. Favorites again came through with flying though somewhat soiled colors.

Coach Mike Shizuru's Crimson Tide from Palama earned a brilliant 9-0 victory over Wahiawa on a rain-swept field in an important 140 $\frac{1}{2}$  game, while the Police G-Men were staving off a determined Hawaiian Diver outfit 13-7 at Makiki Field. Palama and G-Men are now tied for the league leadership with two wins apiece, and their collision this Sunday morning at Makiki Park should be a classic. Both teams have flashed smashing offensives and defenses in defeating the opposition.

The powerful Kalihi-Kai 125 $\frac{1}{2}$  machine clicked on all cylinders to score a 13-0 win over "Soup" Higa's crippled McInerny Monarchs at Lanakila Field. A heavy down-pour caused the Kalihi Babes-Aiea game to be cancelled.

In fairness to McInerny, it must be said that the Monarchs played without the services of five regulars who were forced to retire from football.

Jimmy Tomita's Nishikiya Ramblers hung up an impressive 19-0 triumph over the Pal Babes at Castle Field to remain in the running for top 125 $\frac{1}{2}$  honors. The set-back marked Palama's second loss in the still young season, and another defeat will blast it off the championship race.
