FAVORITES WIN IN BAREFOOT TUSSLES SUNDAY

Favorites came through with colors a little tattered but flying as the Citywide Palama 130# barefoot football league completed its second week of play with six games on city and rural gridirons Sunday, September 17.

Kyodo Kai's brilliant 13-0 victory over Alfred Espinda's defending-champion Aiea Rams at Castle Field highlighted the day's activities. The Kyodo barefooters stopped the vaunted Aiea running offense cold throughout the tussle, but were wide open against their aerial attack. Goshima picked his way through tackle for Kyodo's first score in the first quarter on a 30-yard jaunt. Maha Tomita circled left end for 50 yards and another score in the third quarter. Tomita converted by placement. The victory was Kyodo Kai's second in as many starts, and stamped them as the team to whip for the championship.

Charlie Chan paced Kyodo Kai into the win column by taking Barbecue Inn 6-0 at Lanakila Field. Nomura's two passes in the second period gave Charlie Chan the victory when he pitched one to Katayama for 25 yards, and another to Utsumi in the end zone.

Ewa remained on top with West Section leaders by dumping Waipahu 12-6 at Waipahu. A loose fumble which Thomas, Ewa line-man, plucked out of the air and packed 35 yards for a touchdown in the last quarter cost Waipahu the victory. Ewa opened the scoring by tallying on a fake placement which ended in a pass early in the second quarter. Takemi Arakawa tied the count for Waipahu by slashing off-tackle for 27 yards in the third quarter.

Loo's Place continued its march to the East Section title by squashing Lido Cafe 19-0 at Cartwright Field. Hinode Kai made its 1939 debut in impressive fashion by taking Moiliili Nesei 7-0 at Crane Park. Waialae YMA downed Smile Cafe 12-6 to end East Section hostilities.

PAL BABES TO TACKLE AIEA RAMS THIS SUNDAY

The Pal Babes will journey to Aiea this Sunday, September 24, to tackle Alfred Espinda's Aiea Rams in a scheduled 130# Citywide-Palama barefoot football league game. The kickoff is slated for 10:00 a.m.

Twice beaten on city gridirons, the Rams will answer the opening whistle determined to vindicate themselves before a home crowd. The Pal Babes, still smarting from a crushing 27-0 setback by Kyodo Kai in their debut a week ago, will attempt to crash the win column at the expense of last year's champions.

SCHOOL SWIM CLASSES BEGUN AT PALAMA TANK

Public School swim classes began their annual fall attendance at the Palama pool Monday, September 18, under the expert supervision of Reed Maxson and Jimmy West, Boys' and Girls' physical directors respectively.
