FAVORITES WIN IN 130# BAREFOOT SKIRMISHES

Two-Step Inn, Ewa Plantation, and Loo's Place, favorites in the Citywide-Palama 130# barefoot football league, continued to dominate play with undefeated records by coming through with victories Sunday, October 1, as the circuit completed its fourth week of play on urban and rural gridirons.

Loo's Place achieved another milestone in its march to the East Section title by whipping Moiliili Nesei 6-0 at Crane field. The victory was Loo's fourth in a row.

Hinode Kai and Smile Cafe battled to a 7-7 deadlock in the sweltering heat, and Lido Cafe crashed the win column for the first time by taking Hui Makai 6-0 at Cartwright field in other East Section skirmishes.

Masuto Fujii's powerful Two-Step Inn chalked up its fourth victory without being scored upon by thumping Charlie Chan 12-0 at Lanakila field, to remain on top in West Section standings.

Ewa Plantation kept its slate clean by whipping a surprisingly tough Pal Babes combine 14-7 at Castle field. Waipahu, led by Takemi Arakawa, handed an old rival the defending-champion Aiea Rams, a 14-0 shell-lacking to stay in the championship running.

The Citywide-Palama league will again offer six slashing games this Sunday, October 8.

110# CAGERS COMPLETE FOURTH WEEK OF PLAY

Hui Imua opened the fourth week of play in Palama Settlement's 110# basketball league with a sterling 21-15 victory over the Raiders Tuesday evening, September 26, in the Westside gym. The tussle was the first game of a twin-bill which saw Toyo A. C. crush Maggie's Inn 25-10 in the night-cap.

Okaniku and Maeshiro sparked the Hui Imua triumph by registering eight and six points respectively. Koide starred for the Raiders with three field goals.

Toyo A. C. encountered little difficulty in walloping Maggie's Inn behind the fine shooting of Kato and Tamai, who tallied seven points each. Miyashiro was the only Maggie performer to find the meshes with any degree of consistency.

Castle A. C. swamped the Pirates "A" team 27-18 in the opening skirmish of Thursday's twin-attraction which preceded Hui Aliis' 31-15 victory over the Raiders.

Bill Koga's spectacular basket-garnering sparked Castle's win over the Pirates. Koga accounted for 10 points. Shirohama with six, and Kinumatsu with five, gave Koga brilliant support. Albert Chow stood out for the Pirates with seven digits.

Raymond Choo's Hui Aliis came through with their first victory in three starts largely through the efforts of Eddie Lum and Dick Suenaga. Lum rang the bell for 12 points, while Suenaga bagged seven. Koide chalked up six markers for the Raiders to stamp himself the main cog for his team.

Following completion of Thursday's tussles, Pirates "B" was still leading the league with a seasonal mark of three victories and no losses. The defending-champion B. K. Yamamoto outfit also sported a clean slate with two wins in as many starts. Castle A. C. is the only other team conceded a chance for the championship.
