COMMUNITY CAGE LEAGUES TO ORGANIZE OCT 26

Palama Settlement's 1938 Community 120 and 135 pound basketball leagues will be organized next Wednesday, October 26, at 7:00 p.m. in the Settlement auditorium. All clubs interested are requested to send representatives, without fail, to the meeting.

Opening games are tentatively slated for Tuesday, November 8, in response to popular demand by teams that have been practicing for the leagues for the past two months. Another factor influencing Settlement officials to organize early is the big interest stirred up by the fast 110# circuit now in swing.

Nineteen clubs, with rosters totaling 250 cagers, participated in the 1937 competitions, and all indications point to a larger entry list this year. Seven 135 and twelve 120 pound outfits representing every section of Palama community, flashed brilliant basketball in battling for the championships.

Tommy Wong coached a fine Pirate team to the 120 pound title, while Heoji Kumashiro's McInerny Monarchs whipped a tough field for the 135 pound crown. Both teams will be entered again, with the Pirates planning to move up and challenge McInerny's supremacy. McCULLY GAINS PAL 110# BASKETBALL LEAD

Coach Howard Hiroki's high-riding McCully cagers fought their way into the leadership of Palama Settlement's $110\frac{L}{n}$ basketball league by eliminating two dangerous contenders for the title last week at the Palama gym. The McCully quintet, easily the best drilled and improved team in the league, walloped Jimmy Lam's Castle A.C. 26-14 Tuesday, October 11, and then came back on Thursday, October 13, to outscore Sumida Express, 36-34, in sensational manner in an extra-quarter game.

The brace of victories gave McCully undisputed leadership in the circuit with five wins in six starts. B. K. Yamamoto is in second place with a seasonal record of four victories and one loss. The league championship will probably be decided this Thursday evening, October 20, when the two teams tangle at 7:00 o'clock.

Castle A.C. proved a comparatively easy victim to the flashy McCullys, bowing by a decisive margin. Maetani, playing guard for the Mciliili cagers, shot rings around the Castle boys, chalking up 10 points in his rambles down the court. Tateishi and Oye, with six digits apiece, accorded him sparkling support. Chai, Shirohema, and Kinumetsu, with four points each, starred for Castle.

McCully displayed championship form in conquering Sumida Express after trailing up to the final moments of the game. Sumida ran up a commanding lead in the first half as Bobby Kau hit the meshes for 15 points, but wilted when the going became tough. Maetani again sparked the McCully offense in the pay-off moments to deadlock the regular game at 32 all, and was responsible for the winning basket in the over-time period with 10 seconds left to play.

Bobby Kau, with 17 points, was highscorer for the evening, followed by his hard-playing team-mate Kato with 13, and McCully's Maetani with 10, Ishizaki with 10, Oye with 9, and Tateishi with 7 markers.
