## KAIULANI YOUNGSTERS WIN BIG PUBLIC SCHOOL WATER CARNIVAL

Coach Francis Koga's Kaiulani School swimming stars scored a spectacular victory in Palama Settlement's annual Public School Water Carnival, last Wednesday afternoon, May 26th, by piling up the huge aggregate of 107 points over rivals from other elementary schools, at the Palama tank. Puuhale splashed into second position with 43 digits, and was trailed by Likelike and Lanikila with 30 and 14 markers respectively.

In romping off with the championship trophy which was at stake, the Kaiulani youngsters churned the Settlement pool to a froth to capture nine first places out of a possible 13, sweeping all points in the 40 yard breaststroke for boys under 14 years of age, in so doing. However, the other competitors gained some consolation when Francis King of Puuhale School took three blue ribbons to prove himself the outstanding performer of the meet.

Every event on the program was run off in clock-like fashion, and may be credited to the fine work of John Makolo, announcer and starter, Mr. Wilber Wood, general chairman of the carnival, Nelson Kawakami, Susumu Awaya, Sylvester Abili, Elmo Tomita, and Ben Sagawa, judges, and in particular to the superb efficiency of the lass who served as clerk.

The tremendous success of the meet may also be attributed to the splendid cooperation tendered by principals of the participating schools to the sponsors, and in a large measure, to the loyal rooting sections which jammed every available space in the bleachers bordering the tank to shatter the lazy calm of the May afternoon with their colorful enthusiasm.

### CASINO CROWNED PAL VOLLEY CHAMPIONS

The star-studded Casino A.C. slam outfit crowned themselves 1937 Palama Community Volleyball champions last Monday evening, May 24th, by smashing Auld Lane 15-0 and 15-4 in the first game of a triple header at the Palama gym. The victory marked Casino's seventh consecutive win for the season and enabled them to finish their schedule in a blaze of glory.

Azevedo's giant-killers from the Kakaako waterfront rushed into second position in the final standings by swamping Fern Park 15-2 and 15-4 in the second tilt of the evening, while the Moanalua Ramblers gave Nanakuli its sixth straight set-back 15-4 and 15-6 to lower the curtain on the 1937 season.

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## GIRLS' SUMMER PROGRAM ALL SET

Palama girl members and women too, certainly have a splendid summer recreation program in store for them.

The girls who have attended the former dance schools will be interested to learn that the Dance School which is scheduled for every afternoon from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. will be under the direction of Miss Key Singlehurst. Miss Singlehurst conducts her own dance studio throughout the year and has received most of her training in New York. It was only by a lucky chance that Palama was able to secure a teacher of Miss Singlehurst's type, and the dance school promises to be the best in six years.

Instruction will be given in Tap, Ballet, Russian, Dutch, Hungarian, Spanish Acrobatic, Hula, and Natural dancing. A class in tap and social dancing for adults will be given on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

A Handcraft program which will include classes in Wood-carving, Block-printing, Dramatics, Lauhala Weaving, Ukulele and Piano lessons, glee club work, Rhythm Band, Art, Cooking and Sewing has been planned from 9:00 to 11:00 every morning. Miss Newsom, a new worker, will have charge of the craft work and will be assisted by Miss Ontai, Mrs. Hohu, Mr. Fujimoto, and Miss Furmidge.

The athletic program starting at 10:00 a.m. and continuing all day under the direction of Mrs. West will offer a variety of activities for girls and women. Swimming will start the day and classes in tennis, tumbling, Badminton, life-saving, diving will be given throughout. In addition, teams will be organized in baseball, volleyball, soccer, and track and field activities.

## HAWAIIAN QUILT EXHIBITION

A two-day exhibition of over one-hundred Hawaiian quilts will be held at the Palama Settlement gymnasium, June 3rd and 4th, by the adult classes of the Vocational Division of the Department of Public Instruction. Doors will be open from 1:00 to 10:00 p.m. on Thursday, and the display will continue on the following day from 8 in the morning to 4 in the afternoon. The public is invited.

The work of the combined adult classes from Aiea, Waipahu, Kalihi-Uka, Likelike, Lunalilo, Palama, Liholiho, and the Y.W.C.A. will be featured in the exhibit. The various steps of quilt-making from laying out of patterns to the finished product will also be included.

Commencement exercises will be held on Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock. Five mothers will receive their certificate from Mrs. Caroline W. Edwards of the Vocational Division of the Department of Public Instruction at that time.

In order to graduate, a student must complete three quilts by herself. The mothers who are graduating that night are: Mrs. Lizzie Naholawaa of Kalihi-Uka, Mrs. Harriet Smith of Aiea, Mrs. Georgiam Fernandez of Pauoa, Mrs. Hoopii De Lovio of Papakolea, and Mrs. Annie Ouye of Likelike.

A talk on Hawaiian Art will be given by Mr. Eben P. Lowe.

Through the courtesy of Frank J. Viera, the Royal Hawaiian Band will entertain with a half hour band concert. Hawaiian entertainment will also be featured. Dr. P. S. Platt of Palama Settlement will be the chairman.

Among the fifty patterns used by the mothers for their quilts are: Kaomi Malii (Love Story), Haleakala Highway, Lei O Haleakala, Lei Ilima, Lei Mokihana, Ka Wehi O Palama (The Beauty of Palama), Keha Pai Pua O Elenale (The Title of a Hawaiian Love Story), Ka Nani O Ka Homa (The Beauty of the Home), Roselani, Makani Appaapaa O Kohala (The Crackling Winds of Kohala), Kalakaua's Kahili, Hanohano Hanalei, Leilehua, Bird of Paradise, Pikaki and Tuber Rose, Breadfruit, Hibiscus, and Plumeria.

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## RESULTS OF LEARN TO SWIM CAMPAIGN

Reports from the five institutions that participated in the Learn to Swim Campaign of May 3rd to 21st reveal that a total of 1,119 students enrolled in the Campaign. There was a small decrease compared to last year's 1,125.

A decided drop was noticed in the number of pupils passing the beginners test. Last year 677 students passed through the flying colors, while this year only 597 made the grade. One reason for the drop according to Nuuanu Y authorities was that a great many of the youngsters were below normal physical vitality, thus handicapping them to swim the required distance. A believe it or not fact showed that the students from the health classes from the various schools gained weight in most cases.

The total expenses for this year amounted to \$246.98. The amount collected plus the A.R.C. fund gave a sum of only \$204.70, leaving a shortage of \$42.28. However, the Committee in charge thinks that there is a possibility of making up the deficit.

Out of the 1,119 youngsters registered, Palama had the most, 472. Under the capable directions of Mrs. Homer West, Nelson Kawekami and John Makolo, 211 students passed the A.R.C. test at Palama.

She was instructed to use two fingers instead of one when eating poi. Knowing that she is still a malihini, the hostess asked her if she cared to use a spoon instead. Brave Mrs. West made a trial of using her finger instead of fingers as told. At the first dip, she thought she was digesting "library paste." However, she tried the "library paste" three times before giving up.

The guests tried to teach her to dance the hula. Encouraged, she plans to take hula lessons in the near future. To her, Hawaiian music is lovely.
