## PALS SWAMP SANTA BARBARA IN PENTATHLON

Palama Settlement's versatile crew of pentathlons swamped Santa Barbara for the second consecutive time in "radio" competition by chalking up a 279-85 score in the pentathlon held recently. Scores were compiled on a 5,4,3,2,1 basis.

The wide distance separating Santa Barbara Boys' Club in California and the local club was spanned by radio-amateurs Sgts. Brown and O'Brien, Headquarters Battery, 13th Field Artillery, Schofield Barracks, whose fine work in receiving and sending results enabled the sponsors to run the meet without any hitches. Vincent Haggerty handled the Santa Barbara end of the radio pentathlon faultlessly.

Palama Settlement scored heavily in all divisions of the five-event competition, running up big margins and showing all-round strength. Scores by classes follow:

Santa Barbara won only two first places in 25 events, both in the broad jump, when Moreno leaped 8' in the 95# division, and Tyus stretched the tape 9' 1" in the Unlimited class. The greatest individual performances of the meet were Mack Lee's brilliant 5' 8" effort in the Unlimited high jump, and Francis Sing's 24 baskets in the same bracket.
