



December 22, 1936

A few days ago, when all of us were down with the grippe, our family doctor told us an amazing story, which we all believed without question. And yet, after he had gone, I somehow distrusted the whole thing, without knowing why. Perhaps you can tell me whether the story could be true.

The doctor said that some/years he was prospecting for gold in American Fork canyon near Salt Lake City, when he observed a patch of hoarfrost at the base of a cliff. It seemed odd to him that hoarfrost should appear in the summer sunlight, so he cut into it with a pick, when, lo, the wall broke through. ## B.G.A. TROPHY WON BY LULU KEA

The Guy Rothwell trophy, a lovely silver loving cup, given to Palama Settlement as the trophy for the Best Girl Athlete Competition has been won permanently by Lulu Kea and will be awarded Dec 26 at the Saturday afternoon movies.

Lulu, who is only 14 years old at the present time, has won the cup for the past three years. Many of her winning points came from track events. Although the greater portion were won in swimming. Lulu is truly an all around athlete. However, she did'nt win her laurels easily for she received keen competition from Florence and Huruko Akamine who were only a few points behind her. It is the hope of the Girls Department that Lulu will continue in athletics and achieve still more greatly providing doubly her right as a holder of the Best Girl Athlete Trophy.

The silver loving cup, won by Lulu, has been in use for eleven years as the Best Girl Athlete Trophy. Mr. Guy N. Rothwell gave the cup to Palama in 1925 with the inscription "to be won three times". Since the presentations hundred of Palama Girls Athlete have competed for the cup and nine different girls have held it for One girl, Lily Wong, held one year. it for two years and then failed to enter the competition for the third Ellen Kapahua came very close to winning it the second time in 1931 when she was nosed out by Olive Me-The names on the cup present a small history of the Girls Recreation Department membership. ### HETTEMA FEATURED AT PAL CAUB MEETING

Mr. Harry Hettema, an old favorite with the Falama youths, was the guest speaker of the Pal Club meeting last Sunday morning in the Settlement auditorium. Always a big hit with his philosophic humor, Mr. Hettema lived up to advance expectations by giving the assembly a clear-cut definition of the "Seventh Commandment" and its synonym in everyday life. "Adultery" or temptation as Mr. Hettema interpretes it, is "a moment of bliss, five minutes of joy, a half hour of pleasure, and a lifetime of regret."

The advantages of cross-breeding to merge the better qualities of two different species was also stressed by Mr. Hettema. He cited as an example, the grafting of beautiful fragile tulips from his native Holland with those less delicate but hardier American grown bulbs to create a tulip showing the best strains of each flower on its petals.
