PALAMA SETTLEMENT IS SCENE OF HAWAIIAN QUILT DISPLAY

Beautifully designed Hawaiian quilts valued at thousands of dollars by experts but priceless to their owners, were on exhibition to the public last Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, June 3, 4, and 5, in the Palama gym as the highlight of Mrs. Hannah Baker's Adult Quilting Commencement Exercises. Five mothers qualified for certificates offered by the Vocational Division of the Department of Public Instruction to students of Mrs. Baker's classes who completes three quilts by themselves during the year. Those who achieved the distinction were Mrs. Georgiana Fernandez and Mrs. Harriet Smith of Aiea, Mrs. Lizzie Naholowaa of Kalihi-Uka, Mrs. Annie Ouye of Likelike School, and Mrs. Hoopai De Lovio of Papakolea.

The spacious Westside recreation hall was jammed with spectators at the opening night of the display when the candidates for diplomas were honored amidst a colorfully resplendent background of quilts. Hula interpretations featured the evening's program, and the brightest performer of the star-studded entertaining troupe proved to be little Mabel Meheula, Palama's own product. Interested visitors continued to file through the gymnasium during the remaining two days and evenings of the quilting show, admiring the wonderful handiwork on display.

Immediately preceeding the opening of the gymnasium doors on Thursday, the Royal Hawaiian Band under the direction of Frank J. Vierra, rendered a half hour of selected pieces beneath the monkey-pod which shades the Settlement lawn.

TROOP SIX WINS BOY SCOUT SWIM MEET

A well-balanced team from Troop #6 won Palama Settlement's annual Boy Scout Swimming Meet at the Palama tank last Saturday afternoon, June 5, by amassing a grand total of 40 points to defeat the fine galaxy of 14 troops representing nearly every Boy Scout unit in the city. Troop #8 pulled into second place by tallying 33½ digits, leaving in its wake Troop #19 with 31 points, Troop #21 with 24½, and Troop #43 with 11 markers.

Overhauling Troop #8 in the final events with Gilbert Ching, sensational McKinley sprinter, as the spearhead, Troop #6 registered in the championship column after all had seemed lost. Ching scored victories in the 100 yard Freestyle and Diving events, and was ably paced by his teammate Nakayama, who won the 50 yard Backstroke and placed second in the 75 yard individual medley race.

Paty and TwigSmith of Troop #8, Chang of Troop #19, and Hayashi of Troop #21 were other twinkling stars of the splash.

The water carnival was staged under the chairmanship of Scoutmaster Edward Matsuoka of Palama Settlement. Matsuoka was assisted in fine style by John Makolo who served as starter, Stanley Lee and Charles Oh, announcers, and Nelson Kawakami, Francis Sing, Herbert Scharsch, Sylvester Abili, Henry Yuen, and Elmo Tomita, judges. One startling upset featured Palama Settlement's seventh week of Softball competition, which was again marred by wholesale forfeitures, last Sunday morning, June 6th, at Castle Field.

A hard-fighting Kaiulani nine gave the dope bucket its hardest boot of the current season by dumping the star-studded Shell Oil crew 8-2 in a Section "C" game, to tangle up the sectional standings. The Kaiulani, Shell Oil, and Aiea outfits are now tied for the Section "C" title with six victories apiece in seven starts.

The Chinese Amateurs came through with an 11-3 win over the McInerny Juniors to keep their record clean in the "A" Section race. The defending-champion Stonewall A.C. also scored its seventh consecutive triumph when the Crusaders forfeited. The two division leaders will cross bats next Sunday morning at 12:00 noon, for the Section "A" championship in what looms as a toss-up.

McInerny Monarchs virtually cinched the Section "B" gonfalon by repelling Palama Shoe 10-6 in a thrilling tussle, and will meet winners of the other two brackets for the 1937 Palama Community Softball crown late this month.

LIKELIKE GIRLS WIN SWIMFEST

The third annual grade school meet for girls sponsored by Palama was won by Likelike School who scored a total of 85 points. MEDALS AWARDED TO GIRL SWIMMERS

A total of nineteen medals were won by the girls' swimming team of Palama at the recent Duke P. Kahanamoku and Hawaiian AAU swimming meets, respectively. The eight medals from the Kahanamoku meet are on their way to the mainland.

Lulu Kea received three medals from the AAU meet. For placing second in the 100 yards backstroke for women (championship event) and the fifty yard freestyle for women junior, she was awarded two silver medals. As a member of the 150 yard medley relay under 15 years, she got a gold medal.

Frances Taum was presented a silver medal as member of the 150 yard medley relay, and a bronze one for placing third in the 100 yard freestyle for women (championship event). She captured fourth honors in the 100 yard backstroke event.

Gold medals were given to Irene Hee, Florence Akamine, Haruko Akamine, Mary Ann Kcaulana, members of the 75 yard novice relay for women. The 75 yard medley relay winners, Frances Taum, Lulu Kea, and Florence Akamine received gold medals also. Both teams copped first place in their respective events.

Libby Aoki, Lulu Kea, Frances Taum of the 75 yard medley relay under 13 did not receive any awards for taking second honors. No award was given to Haruko Akamine who placed fourth in the 100 yard breaststroke for the championship women event.
