Colorful pantomime dances done to the typical folk songs of Japan, the Philippines and Korea will be performed Saturday night, December 18th, at the First Methodist Church - 1028 So. Beretania. The Concert, which is sponsored by Palama Settlement Music Department, features a children's choral group of eighty voices under the direction of Mrs. Keum Nyu Park. Typical folk songs were chosen by Mrs. Park to illustrate the indigenous music of the countries to be represented. The children almost all of whom are island born have caught the flavor of the songs and give a very realistic performance so that a native of the countries whose songs will be sung will surely feel at home. The dances will all be in costume.

The program of folk songs will be: - Yuyake Koyakete (Japanese); Kutsu Ga Naru (Japanese); Leron, Leron, Sinta (Filipino); Dal Ah, Dal Ah (Korean); and Sweet the Evening Air of May (Hungarian).

The second portion of the hour long program will feature Mrs. Leola Wilkins, flutist and Mrs. Belle Chamberlin, cellist. The chorus will sing well known selections from George Frederic Handel including the beautiful "When You Walk" and the Recitative "To Heavens Almighty King We Kneel."

The final group of songs will be Christmas selections from Germany, France, Italy and Poland. The concluding song, "Joy to the World" to be sung by the audience and the choir will end the program on a high note of the traditional joy of the Christmas season.

Assisting Mrs. Keum Nyu Park will be Thelma Chock, accompanist. Soprano soloist is Virginia Rodrigues Suehiro. Pantomimists are Kathleen Ma, Mary Lee, Sandra Lee, Barbara Harada, Carol Inoue, Gail Inoue, Carolyn Furuta, Aileen Ihori and Janice Fujii.
