TWO OUTFITS TIED FOR PAL BASEBALL TITLE

Pink Elephant Inn 15; Crusaders 8 Billy's Barber Shop 11; Frankie's Cab 8

Billy's Barber Shop scored a stunning 11-8 upset over Frankie's Cab in the main attraction of the Palama Community Baseball League's closing twin-bill before a big crowd Sunday, March 26, at Castle field. The victory snapped a seven-game winning streak and threw the title race into a tie between Frankie's Cab and Pink Elephant Inn. Pink Elephant Inn had humbled the Crusaders 15-8 earlier in the morning to hang onto an outside chance for the championship, and Billy's Barber cinched it in spectacular fashion.

The championship tussle will be played this Sunday, April 2, at 10:00 a.m. on the Castle diamond. Frankie's Cab whipped Pink Elephant Inn 6-2 in the season's opener and is favored to duplicate the victory.

Billy's Barber Shop ran up a commanding lead in the opening frames and scored five runs on five hits before Frankie's Cab dented the rubber twice in the fifth inning. The Barbers registered one run in the sixth, but Frankie's Cab came back with three in its half of the same inning to make the score 6-5, which remained unchanged until the ninth chapter. Taking their turn at bat, Billy's Barbers crossed the plate five times on three hits, two errors, and a base on balls in a wild spree before Collen retired the side. Frankie's Cab made the game interesting by scoring three runs on a walk and three straight hits by Costa, Rodrigues, and Hewison with no hands down. However, Hewison was nipped trying to steal home, Custino tagged out on a hidden ball play at first, and Ferreira flew out to center to end the rally and the ball game.

Miller went the route for Billy's Barber Shop and allowed 11 hits, while Frankie's Moniz and Collen were nicked for 10 bingles. Wedemeyer starred at bat for Billy's Barbers by hitting safely three times in five attempts and driving in four runs.

Pink Elephant Inn walloped the Crusaders behind the 5-hit pitching of C. Bernard, and heavy stickwork by B. Wedemeyer, Gunderson, and J. Perry. The Crusaders led Pink Elephant Inn 7-6 at one stage of the game but were buried under a deluge of runs in the ensuing innings.
