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PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

During the past year, the Board of Trustees held nine regular monthly meetings, and three special meetings, and maintained their previous year's record of an average attendance of 13 Trustees per meeting. In addition to the Board meetings, the Trustees attended many committee meetings.

One of the busiest committees, the Buildings and Grounds Committee, under Kenny Young as chairman, and with the energetic help of Jack Clarke, handled the complex problem of leasing our "makai" property. Many thanks to the Trustees who served on this and on the other standing committees.

Two special committees also occupied much of our busy Trustees' time. One was the Survey Commission, organized jointly with the Honolulu Council of Social Agencies. The other was an Operating Committee that was appointed in October, owing to my inability to serve effectively as president. I am very thankful to First Vice-President Herbert Keppeler, Operating Committee Chairman Bobby Rath, and other members of this committee for their fine response in a time of need for strong leadership.

We lost, this past year, the services of Trustees Patsy Mink, Arthur Akinaka, and Hung Wo Ching. We welcomed aboard new Trustees Bill Gee and Matsy Takabuki. Bill's newspaper duties prevented his attending Board meetings, but he was an active supporter of Palama's program. Matsy was unceremoniously saddled with committee chores even before his first Board meeting, and among other things we are grateful to him for having Palama's Charter renewed (July 6, 1960), not for another 50 years but in perpetuity.

Again, many thanks to the members of the Board for their work this past year, and best wishes for the years ahead.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Palama Settlement provides a people's neighborhood center where all members of the family may participate in improving self and society. The Settlement serves families, individuals, and groups primarily from the Palama-Kalihi geographical areas without discrimination as to race, creed, social or economic conditions. It offers direct and indirect services for improving living conditions in these areas.

Some areas of active involvement in problems of common concern include: youth in conflict, senior citizens, working girls' quarters, working mothers' children, housing developments, urban redevelopment projects, population density, parking and traffic, clean-up campaigns, health and welfare, dangers of gambling and boxing, interracial and intercultural human relationships.

- . Palama land leased to Leeward Realty Corporation.

Generous giving of time, talent and treasures were of special value in the Land Lease Project - clubs and classes - seasonal parties - special events - benefit affairs - trips and outings - construction and painting.

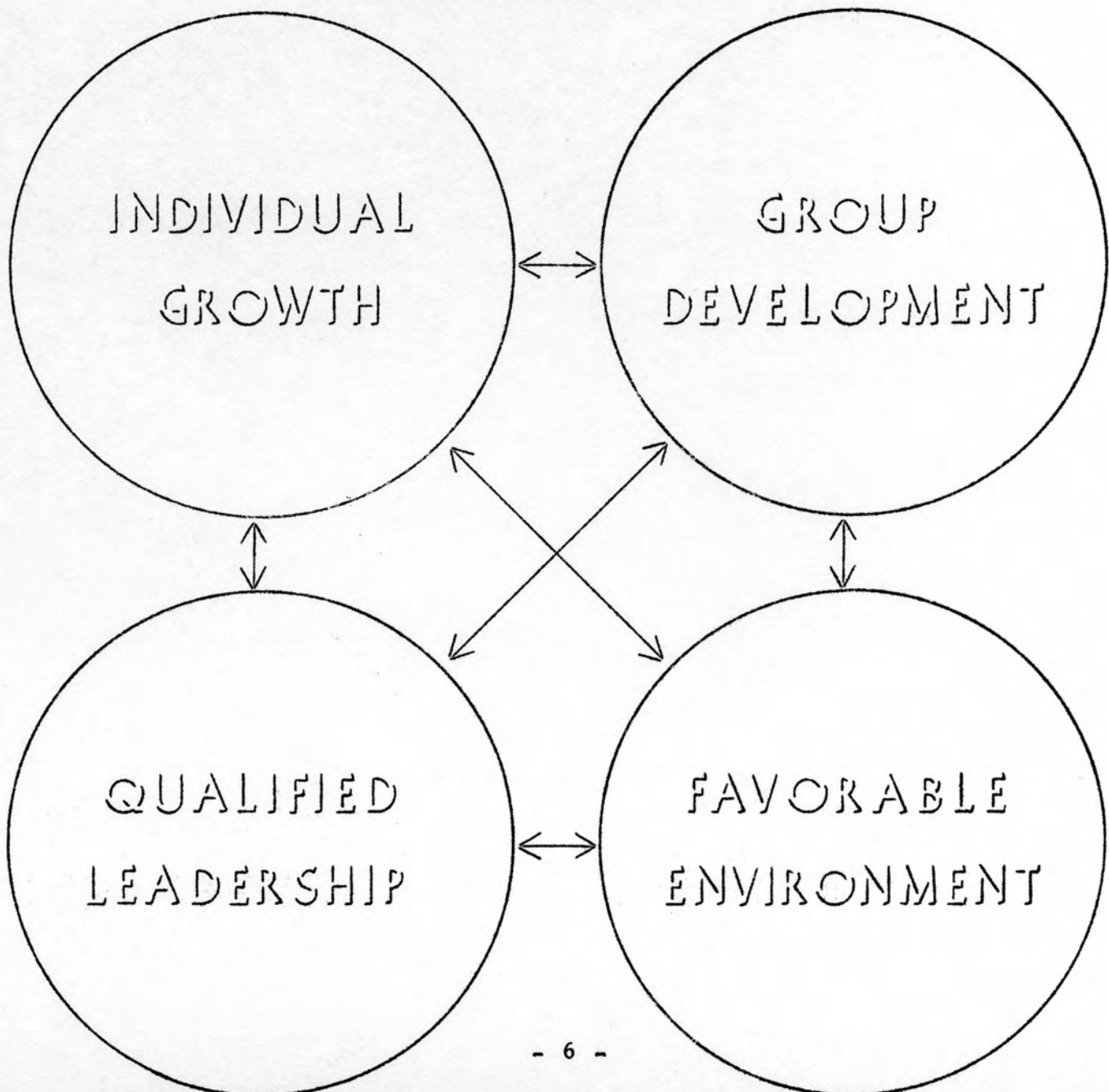

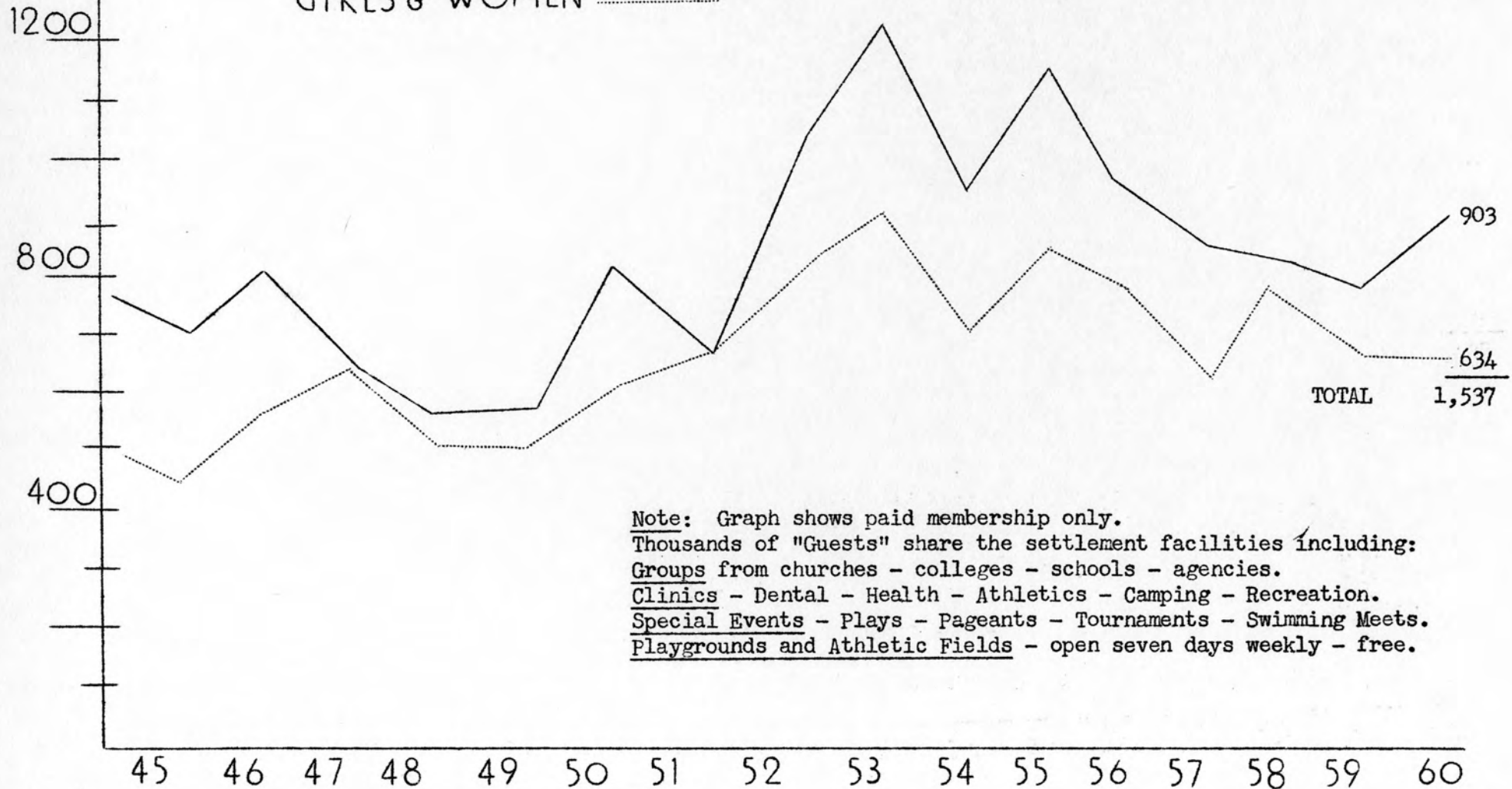
