CONFEDERATION LIFE BLASTS PAL CAGE HOPES

Coach Bill Mountcastle's rangy Confederation Life cage outfit blasted Palama Settlement's hopes of squeezing into the round-robin series by staving off a frenzied Pal rally to win 42-34 in the first game of an ASUH basketball twin-bill last Friday evening at the University of Hawaii gym.

Hoffman Cafe turned in a sparkling 46-28 victory over the Elks in the second tussle behind the slashing play of Ah Chew Goo, colorful All-Hawaii cager.

Hopelessly outclassed in the first half and with a big 29-10 margin to overcome, Fil Marvin's Winged "P" charges made basketball history in the next 20 minutes by shooting and passing Confederation Life dizzy. The Pals carried the fight to their larger opponents and with three minutes remaining in the ball game, brought the count up to 37-34 as the packed stands went wild. At this point, Confederation Life began freezing the ball, causing the Pals to commit costly fouls in desperate attempts to break the stall. The Insurance cagers made good most of their foul tries to sew up the game.

Palama outshot Confederation Life 16 baskets to 13, but gave away 12 points via the free throw route, while garnering only two.

Senior basketball at the Settlement will be finished for the year following the Pal-Cromwell Hawaiians tussle Wednesday, February 15, at the UH court.

Sakuda yielded only four hits but all came at opportune moments. Frankie's Cab scored twice in the third inning and once each in the fourth and fifth stanzas, while the Crusaders' lone tally was registered in the fourth chapter.

Quick Service scored a hard-earned 7-5 victory over Two Step Inn in the second game at 11:00 a.m. Halemano's homer in the last inning broke up a 5-all deadlock to give Quick Service the nod. Batteries were Kaahoa and Kalichikolo for Quick Service, and Horita, Hamada, and Hayashida for Two Step Inn.

Pink Elephant Inn staged a trackfest at the expense of Rengo Kai in the third game at 1:00 p.m. by pounding Rengo pitchers for 13 hits and 22 runs, while holding their opposition to five measly bingles and four runs. Every Pink Elephant player tallied at least once, Machado crossing the rubber three times. Pitcher Gunderson of the winners garnered hitting honors of the game with three safeties in four tries.

Kalihi Valley lowered the curtain on the day's activities by trouncing Al Perreira's Inn 5-2 in the last game. A big fifth inning rally which netted three runs on four successive hits gave Kalihi the winning margin. Gomes, playing first base for Kalihi Valley, enjoyed a perfect day with the willow, connecting for three out of three. One of his hits was an extra base wallop. Batteries were Miller and Silva for Kalihi Valley, and Santos and Texiera for Al Perreira's Inn.

Another quadruple-attraction will be offered next Sunday, February 12, beginning at 9:00 a.m. on Castle field. The third game, slated for 1:00 p.m. will bring together two undefeated leaders, when Kalihi Valley meets Quick Service.

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QUESTIONING A RECENT BASKETBALL DECISION

Manuel Ferreira, veteran cage arbiter, last week rendered a decision which has made him and the principals concerned the talk of basketball-minded Honolulu. Reference is being made to the Confederation Life-Palama game which is listed in the ASUH league score-book as a 42-34 victory for Confederation Life, but which as far as Mannie Ferreira seemed interested, was lost by Palama on a 2-0 forfeit. Mannie called the game with only 30 seconds of play remaining, charging Fil Marvin, coach of the Winged "P" squad, with "unsportsmanlike conduct."

The charge is a serious one - and hardly justifiable under the circumstance. Referee Ferreira socked Marvin for "unsportsmanlike conduct" as the 800 and some odd spectators who had sat amazed as a fighting Palama team stage a sweeping rally to within an ace of victory after being outclassed in the opening half, voiced loud disapproval. It was made against a man who stood for the highest type of sportsmanship - a strict adherer of Rockne's code who demanded the same of his players in every game. Fil Marvin committed three technical fouls in trying to save his team from deliberate fouling in its attempts to smash an airtight stall by Confederation Life.

Whether Mannie Ferreira was justified in forfeiting the contest on such grounds is an open question. Popular opinion is that he acted too hastily and drastically - creating a mountain out of a mole-hill.
