PAL CAGERS TACKLE CROMWELL HAWI'NS TONIGHT

Palama Settlement's senior cagers will tackle Dr. Sam Apoliana's towering Cromwell Hawaiians tonight in the feature of the A.A.U. territorial cage-championships' opening triple-bill at the University of Hawaii gymnasium. The game is scheduled for 9:00 p.m.

Eleven teams, representing the finest basketball talent in the Islands, have filed entry for the tournament, which will play a single elimination series. Wailuku Sugar Company marred up the dope sheet last year in whipping the territory's best and is prepared to defend its title.

Gunning for Wailuku's crown are Kekaha Plantation of Kauai, Maui Agricultural Company, Hilo Eagles, and Oahu's Confederation Life, Palama, Cromwell Hawaiians, University of Hawaii, Hoffman Cafe, Elks, and Dragon quintets.

The Pals will take the court underdogs against the Cromwell Hawaiians, and will rely upon speed to crack the Cromwell defense. Should Palama win, its next opponent will be Maury Parker's ASUH champion Elks, at 7:30 p.m., Thursday, March 23.

FRANKIE'S CAB NEARING PAL BASEBALL TITLE

Frankie's Cab	10;	Two-Step Inn	4

Manager William De Silva's league-leading Frankie's Cab fly-chasers took a strangle hold on Palama Settlement's community baseball championship by walloping Two-Step Inn 10-4 in the feature game of a twin-bill Sunday, March 19, on the Castle diamond. Billy's Barber Shop crushed the Crusaders 13-3 in the other half of the double-header.

Frankie's Cab will trade hits with Billy's Barber Shop this Sunday in the final game of the league schedule. A defeat will give the second-place Pink Elephant Inn a chance to tie Frankie's Cab for the championship.

The taxi-cab crew incidentally chalked up its seventh consecutive victory of the season in downing Two-Step Inn. Collen and Moniz worked on the mound for Frankie's Cab and allowed only two hits, but issued 10 free passes. Horita and Hamada were nicked for 10 bingles by Frankie's Cab, and gave eight bases on balls. Jack Hewison, Frankie's short-stop, was the hitting star of the tussle with three safeties in five trips to the pan. Custino registered two out of four.

Frankie's Cab scored one run each in the first and second innings, two in the second, three in the sixth, one in the seventh, and two in the last chapter, while Two-Step Inn dented the rubber two times in the second stanza, and once each in the sixth and ninth innings.

Billy's Barber Shop snapped out of its slump to swamp the Crusaders 13-3 behind the six-hit masterpiece of Wailama. The Barbers pounded Tanaka for 12 telling blows and performed brilliantly afield. Nobriga starred with the willow for Billy's Barber by lashing out three hits in six attempts.

Two games will be played this Sunday, March 26, when Pink Elephant Inn collide with the Crusaders at 9:00 a.m. and Frankie's Cab take on Billy's Barber Shop at 11:00 o'clock.

Postponed games will be played Sunday, April 2, following the close of the regular schedule. San Miguel and Rengo Kai were dropped from the circuit for defaulting twice each, necessitating the canceling of the Al Perreira's Inn-Rengo Kai and the Two-Step Inn-San Miguel tussles slated this Sunday. However, both Perreira's Inn and 2-Step Inn will be given wins.
