## FIL MARVIN SELECTED PAL PHYSICAL DIRECTOR

Appointment of Filmore C. Marvin, well-known figure in local athletics, as physical director for boys and men at Palama Settlement was recently announced by Dr. Philip S. Platt, settlement director. Marvin assumes his duties today, February 1, filling the biggest gap in the recreation department since illhealth forced Wilder Parker to resign two years ago.

Mervin comes to the settlement with a fine reputation, having done temporary cosching work in local schools. He is a graduate of the University of Southern Celifornia where he majored in physical education. Following graduation from USC, Marvin was a director in the Los Angeles playground department, and was director of physical education at Harvard Military Academy in Los Angeles.

Coaching the Palama senior basketball squad will be Marvin's first job. Marvin is noted for his keen knowledge of the game, and should help the Winged "P" cagers tremendously. His outstanding achievement was the developing of a mediocre Elks team into territorial champions in 1936.


