Riversiders and Pirates were crowned sectional champions of Palama Settlement's 135# basketball league Sunday, December 11 at the Westside gym. The Riversiders took Ethe "A" division title with a perfect mark of five consecutive victories, while the Pirates are "B" section champions with a record of four wins in as many starts.

The defending-champion McInerny Monarchs and Castle A.C. are runners-up in "A" and "B" leagues respectively, and will tangle with the sectional titlists in a round-robin for the 135# flag slated to start this Sunday, December 18, at 10 a.m.

A fast quadruple-bill was offered Sunday as the curtain was lowered on the regular schedules. Riversiders won on a default from the Leaders when the latter failed to make an appearance. The Mavericks took a 2-0 forfeit from Desha Lane when Terada, an ineligible player, crashed the Desha Lane line-up.

Ewa Buccaneers opened the days' activities by nipping McCully 24-23 in a thrilling game. The Buccaneers were leading by a comfortable margin until the final moments when Uno sent McCully into the van with three beautiful baskets. However, Ewa came back with a field goal with seconds left to play, to win the game. Uno was high-scorer with 12 points, followed by Ewa's Wakatsuki with eight.

McInerny Monarchs squirmed their way into the round-robin by turning back Moli Cafe 24-23 in a crucial game. A brilliant second half rally enabled McInerny to top Moli Cafe for the last spot in the play-offs. Silva led the Monarch offense by tallying eight points. Moli was sparked by W. Olsen, whose spectacular shooting all season stamps him the greatest center to show in community leagues at the Settle ment. Olsen hooped 12 points against air tight defense.

The Firates swamped Akepo 47-16 as Lee, Wong, and Loui enjoyed field days. Loui chalked up 13 points, Wong 11, and Lee 10 to completely outclass the Akepos.

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"FACTS AND FIGURES ABOUT THE AUDITORIUM"

"Palama auditorium ain't what it used to be" may be proved by taking a sweeping glance at the stage and new lighting equipment.

Seven years ago a bare stage existed and there was no way of getting out of the two dressing rooms except by a trap door.

Then, in 1934, the platform was extended out in front and today it measures 23 feet across the front. Make-up tables with mirrors, a place to hang clothes and costumes, and lights are some of the vast improvements of the two dressing rooms on each side of the stage. Doors on the front side of each one are the two entrances or exits used in plays and programs. Besides, there are two fire exits in front of the stage on each side. Dark blue drapes of raw silk were bought and sewed by N.Y.A. girls--this costing \$150.

Last Christmas, ordinary footlights were used for lighting effects and each time a different color was wanted, someone had to unscrew the blulb and exchange it. Through Mr. Floyd Wardell (ex-Palama staff member) four 1,000-watt spot lights were bought on the coast for only \$115. Ten fifty-foot cables (\$100) makes possible the use of the lights in the gym, tank, and almost everywhere. Four banks of overhead lights were bought by Palama and set up by Johnny Parker and Bobby Vierra, thus cutting down working expense. Then a \$210 switchboard was ordered from Ramsay & Company. This controls the spot, overhead, and house lights and enables their fading in and out. Mr. "Doc" Wyman of the University of Hawaii calls it "the neatest little switchboard set in the islands."

As yet, nothing has been said on where the finances came from and this mystery should be cleared. Mrs. Charles Gregory, member of the women's advisorship committee and the Junior League was responsible for the news that the Junior League had discussed giving money for children's theater work if they could have the use of an auditorium for practice. Palama contacted them and offered them this privilege.

On October 1, Mrs. P. Wysand, Junior League president, sent Palama a check for \$1,000 for stage and lighting equipment which has since been dispensed with in a worthwhile way.

December 21st will be the real Palama initiation of the stage when the Girls' Department presents a Christmas club program.

Plans to install a ventilating system by Dr. Philip Platt at the beginning of the year is the latest "low-down" on the auditorium.

When the ventilatory system is finished, Palama's auditorium of which the Settlement staff and members are so proud will truly be the most modern in Palama history.

And that's not editorial comment, either!
