The Pals have set the national championship as their goal, and are concentrating all efforts to attain it. Palama has not won a national title since its three-year monopoly six years ago.

The Settlement will bank heavily upon stars of last year's team which finished in 8th place to carry its colors to the top. Buster Lee, Unlimited, Given Goo, 125#, Eddie Lum, 110#, Richard Suenaga, 95#, and S. Kang, 80#, are favored to win Palama championships and make strong bids for national titles.

DAVID ROMAN ELIMINATED FROM BOXING FINALS

David Roman, Palama's last entry in the A.A.U. Boxing Tournament, was eliminated by Japanese-American's Paul Matsumoto in the Oahu semi-finals held last night at the Civic Auditorium. Matsumoto was too experienced and packed too much power for the Palama boy, who was unbeaten in four previous battles against top-flight opposition.

Roman climbed into the ring with everything to win in his first year of competition, a medal from Palama for attaining Class I, a cinch for the outstanding novice trophy, a chance at the knockout award and a crack at the territorial championships, but Matsumoto erased at least two of his possibilities. However, Roman must seriously be considered for the outstanding novice award, and his record of three knockouts in five bouts rate him among the leaders in that department.

Roman's showing should prove an incentive and inspiration to Palama athletes. A quiet, unassuming lad, Roman proved that clean living and conscientious training make for greatness and standout performances. Roman is well-liked by his stable-mates and coaches and is one of the finest athletes ever to carry the Marcon colors into competition.
