

Palama Settlement,

Gentlemen:—A great many venturesome persons have undertaken to tell
the world of conditions that are likely
to exist after, the close of the World
War. Reports of all sorts of associations and organizations are full of prophecies. Your Head Worker, not being
a prophet, and not being possessed with
as much foresightedness as some of his
wiser colleagues, in his line of endeavor,
does not propose to burden you with
his ideas of what society will be in the
future, but to state, in as few words as
possible, Palama's work during the year
1918.

The year began and ended with changes in the staff of workers. Cupid was responsible for the first change and the Red Cross for the last. At the present time, with but two exceptions, our staff of nurses is a new one compared with that of a year ago, while several changes have had to be made to meet the conditions arising from the going into the service of our country of several other workers.

Medical Work.

The Pa Ola Day Camp still lingers in one building, which is very inadequate to house this growing work. A separate dining-room and class-rooms are needed; this would allow of the present quarters being used for rest purposes.

Fresh Air Camp.

During the year 307 mothers and children were given a two weeks' outing at the Fresh Air Camp at Waialua at a per capita daily cost of 54.9c; of this cost, 38.13c was for food, the balance being cost of transportation and wages of servants.

The addition of some five acres of land given to the Settlement by Mr. W. W. Goodale for the balance of his lease will prove a blessing to the camp. This land was cleared at very little expense to the Settlement, through the courtesy of Mr. Rose, sheriff of the City and County, who detailed prisoners to this work.

At present the camp can only care for 64 persons at one time. The addition of a dormitory would add to the capacity of the camp and enable the Settlement to take care of more people during the summer months.
