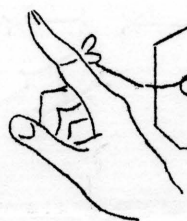

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PALAMA BRANCH LIBRARY MAKES BIG PROGRESS

The year 1937 brought several changes to the Palama Branch Library, the greatest being the removal to the new quarters which has proven to be very pleasant and spacious, and have attracted many new borrowers. In fact, it is now necessary to have four workers on duty most of the time. Two of these workers are provided by the P.W.A. and the N.Y.A.

A complete catalog of all books in the Branch Library is now finished. Since July, a monthly book fund has been allotted with which to buy books that will form the permanent book collection for Palama Branch.

A pamphlet collection of up-to-date material on timely subjects has been made ready for circulation. It has already proven very useful to answer such questions as: "Why should the Constitution of the United States be changed?" "Should the Supreme Court be enlarged?" "Do you know anything about Neutrality?"

Since September, a children's librarian from the main-library girls' and boys' department has been giving book-talks in the near-by schools. This work will continue throughout the school year and we look forward to seeing many new boys and girls becoming library borrowers.

MARVIN INTRODUCES NEW PALAMA COMPETITION

Palama-Athlons, a new athletic club, is being organized by Filmore Marvin, boys' physical director, and will be open to all settlement members under 16 years of age. To be eligible for membership, aspirants must pass a series of 15 tests designed as events fundamentally important in the making of an all-round athlete. The events follow:

1. Punt 35 yards
2. Pass 30 yards
3. Run 100 yards in 12 seconds
4. Jump 12" less than his own height
5. Jump 3 times his own length
6. Put a 15 pound shot 33 feet
7. Shoot 10 successive free throws
8. Swim 50 yards in 30 seconds
9. Swim 50 yards breaststroke
10. Swim 50 yards backstroke
11. Front and Back dives from 10 foot board and pass Red Cross life-saving test
12. Do 10 chin-ups
13. Do 20 push-ups
14. Hold a hand-stand 10 seconds
15. Climb a 20-foot rope in 10 seconds

All boys under 16 interested in qualifying for the Palama-Athlon Club and become real athletes are asked to see Mr. Mervin immediately.

PIRATES DUMP MONARCHS IN "GRUDGE" GAME

Tommy Wong's Pirates, Community 120 pound basketball champions, wrote a brilliant finish to their 1937-38 season by walloping Heoji Kumashiro's McInerny Monarchs 33-30 in a "grudge" game Sunday afternoon at the Settlement gym. The victory firmly established Wong's outfit as the classiest community team ever to show at Palama.

The Pirates went to town behind the individual efforts of Richard Loui, who accounted for 14 points besides playing a fine all-round game. Captain Stanley Lee and Melvin Ja accorded him sterling support throughout.

Henry Silva was McInerny's kingpin, tossing in 7 points, followed by Abellana with 6, and Yamamoto with 5.

A big crowd took in the game which was a benefit for both clubs. McInerny won the community 135 pound title.
