## HUI MAKANI ACES WIN FIRST PAL SPLASH

Harvey Chilton's well-balanced Hui Makani club won Palama Settlement's first invitational swimming meet by scoring 49 points last Thursday evening, April 21, at the Westside tank. Palama Settlement finished in second place with 37 points, followed by the University of Hawaii and Citywide natators with 29 markers, Iolani with 13, and Roosevelt trailing last with 2 digits.

A wildly cheering crowd jammed every available inch on the Pal bleachers and overflowed six deep around the pool to witness Palama's initial effort to help boost swimming in Hawaii.

The Hui Makani splashers were paced by Barney Pung, brilliant McKinley paddler, who stamped himself of Olympic calibre by stopping the watches at 53.4 in the 100-yard freestyle. Pung also topped the 50-yard freestyle in 23.8 and anchored the winning Hui Makani 300 yard medley relay team.

By virtue of their scintillating victory, Hui Makani gained a firm hold on the beautiful trophy which will be presented to the team totaling the highest score in two meets, at the close of the second splash this Wednesday, April 27th.

Citywide A.A. churned into the lead in the race for the women's trophy by tallying 20 points, leaving in its wake, Palama with 17, University of Hawaii with five, and Roosevelt with two.

Added color was given the carnival by the presence of Duke Kahanamoku as referee and starter. Other officials were: Cecil Benny, Hatfield, Parker, and Swan, timers; Cox, Reynolds, Lambert, Werner, and Rodrigues, judges; Chiono Yamane, clerk of course; Lambert, Oka, and Cox, diving judges; and Fil Marvin, announcer. Members of the press were also present.

C. Dudley Pratt presented ribbons to the first, second, and third place winners immediately following an event.

Trials for the second invitational meet were held last night in the Pal tank. The finals this Wednesday evening will be held under similar conditions and handled by the same officials.

Another record crowd is expected to see the team and individual champions crowned.

Rengo Kai made an auspicious debut by walloping Alexander Young Hotel 13-4 in a brilliant upset. Before the shell-lacking the bell-hops were touted as dangerous contenders for the title. Waiaka tossed a monkey wrench into Waipa Lane's championship aspirations by administering the Tomita-coached outfit a 10-7 drubbing to smear the dope-sheet.

Ernest Kauhane's Elders Club scored a sterling extra-inning 4-3 victory over the Akepos when "Bull" Sumida clouted a home-run into deep center to break up a 3-all deadlock and the ball game.

Dole Platform nipped Palama Amateurs 3-2, Spartans downed the Leaders 5-3, and Lakimela chopped Giant Malted Custard 4-3 to complete the quartet of close tilts.

Chinese Amateurs staged a 24-2 track-fest at the expense of the Crusaders for the biggest score of the day. Dole Warehouse followed suit by crushing McInerny Juniors 16-6, as Riverside took Kamamalu for a 12-2 ride.

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## THREE MARKS SMASHED IN BCA SWIM FINALS

Three records, all in the 18-20 year class, went crashing into oblivion before the big splash created by Palama Settlement's B.C.A. swimming finals had settled in the Pal tank.

Mitsuto Tarutani, individual champion in the division, accounted for two of the broken marks, and Paul Silva was responsible for the third. Tarutani smashed the 40-yard freestyle criterion of 19.3 set by See Chong Wong in 1935 by turning the distance in 18.9, <sup>and</sup> again erasing Wong's 10.5 for the 20-yard obstacle race by turning it in 10.1 seconds. Silva washed Elmo Tomita's 10.3 standard for the 20-yard breaststroke registered in 1936 off the Pal record books with a brilliant 10.1 effort.

Besides Tarutani in the 18-20 year class, three other individual champions were crowned at the end of the competition. Samuel Kamahele won the 16-17 year title, David Whang the 14-15, and Buster Lee the 12-13 division. Their performances in every event of the swim pentathlon are listed below:

## WINGED "P" TRACK AND FIELD HOPES DARK

Prospects of Palama Settlement's senior track squad enjoying a banner season appear dim with the Rainbow Relays and the A.A.U. championships less than a month away. The Winged "P" roster can boast of only a handful of stars in the running events and fewer luminaries in the pit and field.

Charley Ornellas, the peer of them all in the middle-distances, is handling the Pals again, assisted by Fil Marvin, Settlement physical director.

Heading the array of potential point winners is Ornellas himself, specializing in the 440, 880, and mile runs, with the 100-yard dash tossed in as a warm-up. George Lee, whose flying spikes made him a threat in every race last year, Elmo "Streak" Tomita, Harold DeMello, Gordon Klein, and Howard Fernandez will carry the sprint assignments.

The Apau brothers, Robert and Jimmy, together with Ornellas and Olds, are the Maroon hopes in the quarter and half-mile runs. Norman Tamanaha, Albert Chun, Burton Hooper, and Fisher round out the mile turnouts. Wun and Salvador of McKinley, first and second finishers in the Interscholastic mile, are probable starters.

Bob Gardner, the Roosevelt hopper, will pair with Lee in the broad jump. They are consistent 21-foot performers. The Pals will bank their high-jump hopes on Freitas, whose 6'1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " gem last Saturday is still the talk of the town. Supporting him are Masuko, Dunn, Edwards, and Cummins.

Emil Carreira and Bordner are the only pole-vaulters on the Westside squad. Carreira has soared over 12 feet in practice.

Two old stand-bys, Pete Kahler and Manuel DeMello, will divide shot-put, javelin, and discus duties between themselves.

Palama's showing in the big meets will depend considerably on the spike magic of Interscholastic stars on the team. Twinkling names of former glory-filled years are missing from the roll. The Lum brothers, Al, Art, Nick, and Jo, Kufferath, Davis, Whittle, Araki, Hamamoto, and a host of others have hung up their spikes, leaving big gaps to fill.
