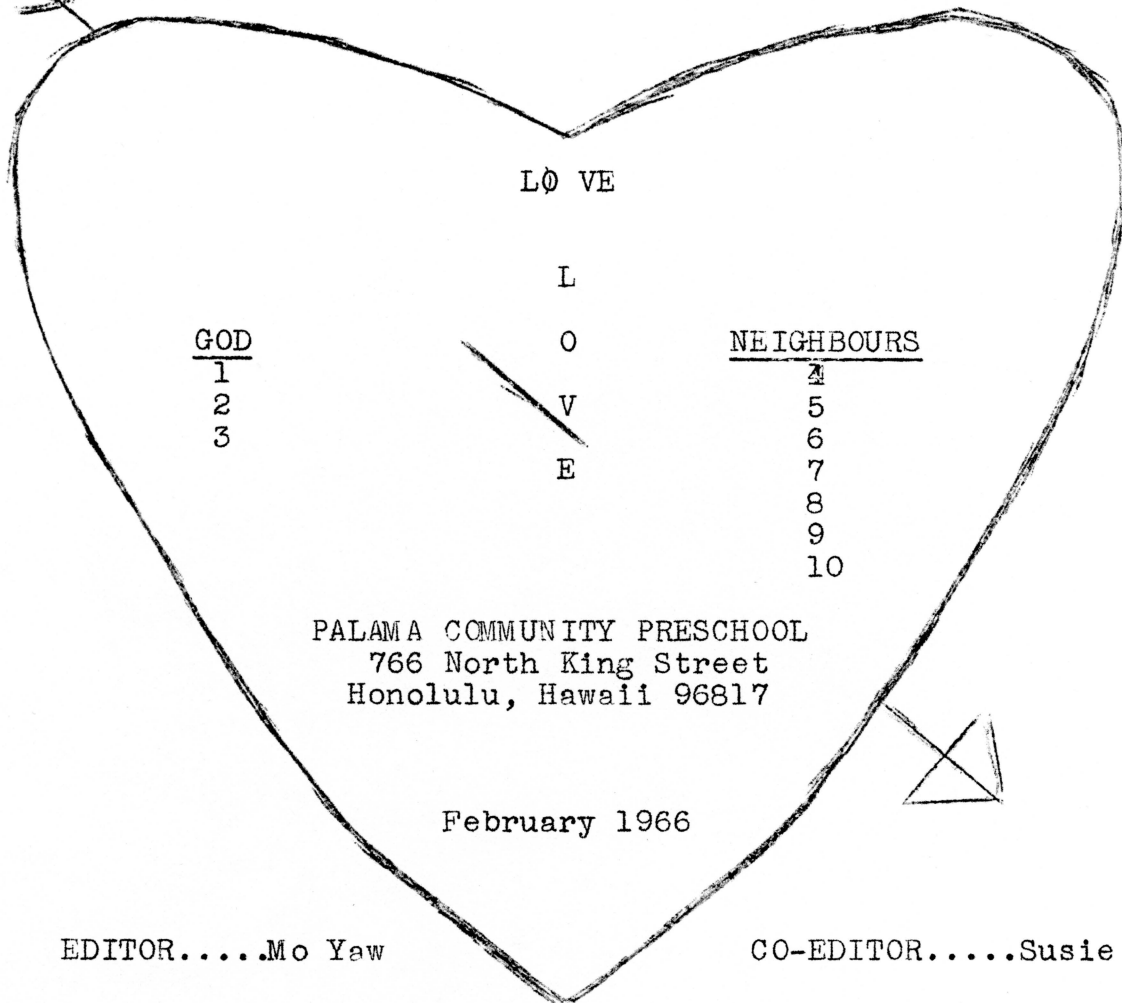

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A Belated Happy Valentine!

Foods for various occasions are always a treat for the family. Though Valentine Day has passed, here is a dessert that might be used for your next Valentine Day or any other day of the year.

This is a modified version of the Japanese kanten. It looks the same but tastes more like the regular "jello". However, it is firmer and doesn't melt as fast.

GELATIN-STYLE KANTEN

3 boxes flavored gelatin, (Jello, Royal, etc.) cherry, strawberry, raspberry or lime. 3 envelopes unflavored gelatin, 3 C cold water and 2 C boiling water.

Dissolve unflavored gelatin in 1 C cold water. Dissolve flavored gelatin in 2 C boiling water. Combine flavored and unflavored gelatin and add 2 C cold water. Stir to mix and pour into an 8" square pan. Let set in refrigerator until very firm. Cut into desired shapes.
