## PAL SECTIONAL SOFTBALL CHAMPIONS CROWNED

Riverside 7; Lakimela A.C. 5 McInerny Monarchs 4; Elders Club 2 Chinese Amateurs 9; Leaders 0

Riverside A.C. and the Chinese Amateurs were crowned Sections "C" and "B" champions respectively as Palema Settlement's community softball league completed its regular schedule before hundreds of fans Sunday, June 12th, at Castle field, Palama. Section "A" standings were tangled as McInerny Monarchs tripped the league-leading Elders Club 4-2.

Lakimela fell before the Riverside bombardment 7-5 in a torrid extra-inning tilt marked by air-tight playing, while the Chinese Amateurs were handed the "B" title on a spoon when the Leaders defaulted. Incidentally, the Amateurs are defending Palama champions.

McInerny Monarchs zoomed back into the championship picture with its scintillating victory over the Elders Club. Both clubs are now tied for the sectional leadership with one loss apiece. They will meet this Sunday morning, June 19th, at 10:00 to decide the championship.

Following the tussle, sectional winners will meet to draw up the championship play-off schedule.
