WILDER PARKER

Born: June 23, 1899 Died: August 12, 1937

Wilder Parker is no more. His going did not come as an unexpected surprise--still it was a distinct shock. Somehow it is difficult to adjust the mind to the knowledge that Wilder's dynamic personality has been chilled and will live again only in legend. For the past several days, local newspapers have mentioned the fact that the Hawaiian Sporting Fraternity lost a colorful and prominent figure with Wilder's passing, but words cannot express the real sorrow in the hearts of those Palama youths who idolized Wilder Parker--feared and respected him--and who regarded "Cap" as their leader and pal. Theirs is a loss that is irreparable.

It has been truthfully stated that Wilder Parker was the peer of all Hawaiian football and basketball officials--fearless, square, honest. His "Pals" also knew him as a fighter who scaled the heights from scratch, and who did not forget his friends on the way up. The boys he helped out of jame are legion--Wilder never failed in going to bat for any Palama boy. Judged by those standards, Wilder Parker was a great man; and if they do not constitute greatness, then greatness must be of little worth.

A Greater Referee than Wilder has summoned him to a sportsman's paradise. Wilder Parker was a young man in years, only 38 when chopped in his stride, but he had lived a full life. May his soul rest in peace!
