PAL JUNIORS RESUME PRACTICE FOR MAUI GAME

Coach Mike Shizuru's Oahu-champion Palama Juniors resumed hard practice yesterday for their coming barefoot tilt with the Maui County titlists scheduled for November 28th at the Honolulu Stadium. This Inter-Island skirmish will carry with it the territorial 140# barefoot football crown.

Palama earned the right to represent Oahu by turning back the best teams on the island in four slashing battles. Hewaiian Divers, Wahiawa, and Police G-Men fell victims to the Maroon squad, the Divers being beaten twice.

The Maui league has not completed its schedule to date, but Allan Free-land's Lahainas loom as the most likely outfit to win the County championship.

Should Lehaina represent Maui, November 28th will mark the second meeting of the two teams. The Pals repelled Lahaina 13-0 on the Stadium greensward in 1935 to annex the territorial title, but are expected to encounter stiffer competition this year. A great game will be in the offing.
