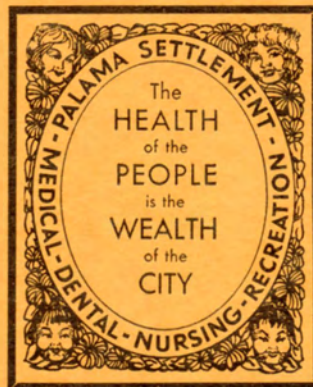

WHAT IS PALAMA SETTLEMENT

Palama Settlement is a unique public health and social welfare center.

It combines four welfare organizations under one roof and one direction, viz.,

- the extensive out-patient clinic of the city,
- a highly organized dental service for school children,
- a public health nursing organization, and
- a broad community welfare center for boys and girls, men and women for athletic activity of all kinds, training in many arts and crafts, and in social and civic behavior.
- It conducts a Vacation Camp at Waialua, available to all.
- It also houses the offices of the Tuberculosis Association of Hawaii, the Hawaii Society for the Control of Cancer, and the Social Hygiene Association of Hawaii (the latter organization having been initiated and conducted as the Social Hygiene Committee of Palama Settlement during the first seven months of the past year.)

The Medical Department consists of a full-time medical director and a staff of 17 full-time and 29 part-time people. The full-time staff includes 4 nurses, 3 social workers, 1 pharmacist, 2 clinic secretaries, 3 stenographers, 2 admitting desk clerks, 1 orderly, 1 attendant; the part-time staff includes 5 physicians, serving from 6 to 18 hours a week, 20 physicians serving one hour a week at prenatal, child health and eye, ear, nose & throat clinics, 1 admitting desk clerk, 1 laboratory technician and 2 janitors.

### Venereal Disease Clinic

During the year 1935 the Venereal Disease Clinic at Palama Settlement has treated 416 cases of syphilis and 521 cases of gonorrhoea, totaling 937. 464 of these were under treatment January 1st, 1935, 362 were new cases admitted during the year and 111 were old patients who decided to renew treatment.

The direct cost of the Clinic, exclusive of overhead, rent, janitor service, light, power, water, accounting and supervision, amounted to \$7,379.19. Palama received from the Board of Supervisors the sum of \$7200 for this work. The average cost per treatment, of which there were 13,705, was \$0.54 and the average cost per patient, of which there were 900, was \$8.20. The entire amount collected from the patients receiving this care was \$468.43.

A large proportion of the cases treated were individuals under the care of public or private institutions - the Juvenile Court, City and County Jail, Military Police and the Social Service Bureau. Of the 468 patients on hand December 31, 1935, 17% were under 12 years of age, 16% 12-19 years of age, 37% 20-29 years of age, 22% 30-44 years of age, and 8% 45 years and over.

### Mothers' Health Clinic

This clinic began its fifth year of service in July, 1935. Under the general direction of the Medical Director, it is conducted by Dr. Muriel Cass, who holds two clinics weekly from 1 to 4 P.M. at the Settlement. She is assisted by a full-time social worker, a full-time clerk-interpreter, a part-time nurse and a part-time attendant. The office is open daily from 8 to 4 for interviews, appointments and purchase of supplies.

During the year, 98 clinics were held; 533 new patients visited the clinic, making together with the revisits of old patients, 2,746 visits to the clinic, 6,315 follow-ups by home visits, letters or cards.

NURSING DEPARTMENT
--------------------

The staff of Palama's Nursing Department consists of a director, an educational supervisor, 2 field supervisors, 17 field nurses, an office secretary and two clerks. The staff of the Bureau of Public Health Nursing of the Board of Health, so far as Honolulu is concerned, consists of 8 field nurses and a supervisor; the Bureau's Director has these and 27 other nurses under her direction, exclusive of clerical assistance. A completely generalized nursing service is provided.

Costs

The direct cost of the Nursing Department was \$44,042.39. The hours of professional service of the field staff numbered 30,591, the hours contributed by student nurses 3,782, or a total of 34,373 hours. This represents \$1.28 as the cost per hour. The total cost of nursing visits amounted to \$25,918.08 for 32,596 visits, or \$0.80 per visit. The balance, \$18,124.31, represents the cost of the other nursing services, such as, prenatal and child health conferences, kindergarten and school supervision, and educational activities connected with these services.

KINDERGARTEN AND SCHOOL HEALTH SUPERVISION

Public health nurses visited the schools and kindergartens regularly in order to assist the school authorities in promoting the health of the children and to aid in the prevention and control of communicable disease. Standing Orders approved by the Territorial Medical Association (Oct. 1930) were followed when first aid or other treatments were necessary. Of the 13,501 treatments given at schools and kindergartens 7907 or 58% were the taking of temperature.

Basing the infant mortality rate upon 19 deaths of infants under 1 year and 2192 infants under one on the registers of the conferences during 1935, the rate is 8.6 per 1000 live births. It is recognized that few infants are registered at the conferences during the first month of life.

EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

During the year five students from the public health nursing course at the University of Hawaii and four senior students from The Queen's Hospital were given field experience with the Palama Nursing Department.

Staff education has been carried on continuously - individually with supervisors and collectively under the direction of a program committee made up of field nurses and supervisors.

MATERNITY SERVICE

Our maternity service in the home includes instruction in health habits, nutrition and other factors influencing the health of the prospective mother, preparation for the baby, actual care of mother and baby after delivery, or instruction to the family and general supervision. The prenatal conference service includes periodic examination by a physician, taking of temperature, pulse, respiration and blood pressure, urinalysis and group instruction in hygiene for mother and baby. Demonstrations show desirable foods, clothes, toilet tray and other equipment including materials for home delivery.

During 1935 prenatal conferences were held weekly at Palama Settlement, Queen's Hospital, Kapiolani Maternity and Gynecological Hospital, and from January to April, at St. Francis' Hospital. Palama nurses were in charge assisted at Queen's and St. Francis by staff and student nurses and at the others by nurses from the Bureau of Public Health Nursing. Physicians at the Settlement and Kapiolani were paid by Palama. At the other hospitals, house physicians and internes maintained the medical service.

## RECREATION DEPARTMENT

The Recreation Department of the Settlement is divided into two divisions, one for boys and men, the other for girls and women. Each has its own director. The two divisions are coordinated and the whole department directed by the Settlement director.

Its purposes are to absorb the leisure time of the youth in the Palama district in such a way as to develop them in body, mind and spirit.

An extensive physical plant including gymnasium, an outdoor swimming pool, locker and shower rooms, athletic field, children's playground, pavilion and equipment, a clubhouse, carpenter shop, domestic science building, tennis courts, auditorium, reading rooms, public library annex, game rooms, clubrooms and offices, afford excellent facilities, which are widely used by all manner of community groups.

Membership is on an age basis, ranging from \$0.50 to \$2.00 a year for girls and women and from \$1.00 to \$3.00 for boys and men. Those unable to pay these fees on an installment plan are given opportunity to earn their membership by working for it. Short-term memberships are permitted for those wishing affiliation with Palama for a single athletic activity.

Well organized programs are prepared to meet the varying needs of the summer months, when children are out of school, the fall season, the winter and spring, following mainland seasonal interests in spite of the slight differences in our seasons.

As a member of the Boys' Club of America our boys' division participate in the national indoor athletic competitions and swimming meets, and as members of the Hawaiian Association of the A.A.U. competitive teams are entered in practically all sports sponsored by this organization. Affiliation with the Honolulu Council of the Boy Scouts of America is maintained through 3 scout troops and one cub pack, with the Y.M.C.A. through 2 Hi-Y clubs, the Girl Scouts through a troop and a Brownie pack. The girls' division also participates in certain A.A.U. activities.

As a community welfare institution Palama Settlement's plant is always at the service of community groups which lack facilities of their own.

V A C A T I O N      C A M P

Palana's Vacation Camp on the ocean at Waialua was used by 3800 people during 1935. The number sleeping at the Camp one or more nights was 2395. They averaged one and a half night per person.

Here is a 17 acre grass-covered, well-wooded recreation center on the ocean beach, bordering the Waialua Golf Course.

The Camp provides ideal accommodations for large or small groups of adults and children. Certain buildings are so arranged that they also give to individual families complete privacy and independence of other parties using the grounds.

Many organizations and clubs have made use of the Vacation Camp each year, because they have found such an unusual combination of comfortable camp facilities and recreational possibilities. Business firms who desire picnic or camping accommodations for their personnel are finding the Camp ideal in every respect. As many as 1000 individuals have enjoyed the grounds at one time.

Rates

Week-end use of Cabin - (Bed and mattress), community kitchen and dining room, pavilion and grounds, 25¢ per person (all day Saturday, Saturday night, and all day Sunday). Cabins contain 2, 4 and 6 beds.

Beach Cottage (6 beds, dining room, kitchen, living room, overlooking ocean), 50¢ per person per night.

Main House (4 bedrooms, kitchen, dining room, lanai, 2 bathrooms, all bed and household linen, accommodations for 8 to 16) - \$1.00 per person per night.

## SOCIAL HYGIENE COMMITTEE OF PALAMA SETTLEMENT

(August 28, 1935 this Committee became the Social Hygiene Association of Hawaii.)

### BECAUSE

- four children get their sex education mainly from older companions in a way that is usually harmful.
- by better sex education we can reduce sexual immorality, venereal infections, abortion, illegitimacy, and sex crimes.
- the proportion of happy marriages can be increased.
- the number of children born to mental defectives can be decreased.

The Board of Trustees of Palama Settlement authorized in 1934 the appointment of a Committee and the employment of a trained educator. This action was approved by the Council of Social Agencies. Roswell H. Johnson, Ph.D., of the University of Pittsburgh, was engaged January 1, 1935 to serve as secretary of the Committee. Palama Settlement has met the cost of this service during 1935 from private funds, other than the United Welfare.

The object of the Committee and later of the Association were:-

To furnish to all who guide children sound material and methods for sex education and guidance.

To preserve and strengthen the family as the basic social unit through family counseling by furthering sex education, training for marriage and parenthood.

To take steps that tend to reduce sexual delinquency and venereal infections.

To emphasize the responsibility of the community and the individual for preserving or improving the quality of future generations by educative and social measures.

To foster such character education and training from childhood up as shall develop better attitudes, ideals, standards, and behavior in respect to sex in its broadest sense.

### Work performed:

- 172 speeches (exclusive of University and other credit courses), attendance 14,833.
- 152 lectures (in 3 University courses and 4 courses credited by the Department of Public Instruction), attendance 11,232.
- 62 personal consultations.

The Secretary has taken an active part in many important community activities.
