Music School Fees Lowered, Attendance Increases

In January of this year the fees for music study at the Palama Settlement Music Department were lowered from \$10 a month to \$5 a month in order to bring the advantages of music learning more into the reach of the average budget. This cutting in half of the cost of piano, voice, music appreciation and other classes was greeted enthusiastically by the Palama community. The enrollment jumped 40% in the first few weeks bringing the highest figure of registered students since the music school was organized in 1946.

The fee reduction and increase in enrollment were made possible by the introduction of group piano methods as well as through the enlarging of the scholarship fund. New students enter group piano classes with a maximum of four per class for the first three months of study. From the fourth month through the second year each child has a private lesson. The fee stays the same throughout.

It isn't every man who can claim the distinction of having served one organization for 43 years. Wallace Saffery, head of the bookkeeping department at Palama, has that record to his credit.

He came to Palama in 1909, a young fellow, just having graduated from the Lahainaluna school at Maui. He started like many important men in our country right at the bottom, as office boy, riding his bicycle around the town on errands. He reminisces about those early days and recalls the new horse and buggy that replaced the bicycle; the street car rides as transportation developed and finally the automobile.

In 1918, Mr. Saffery went into the physical education department at Palama and remained there for seven years as a regular boys worker.

However, in June of 1925, when Palama moved into its present quarters, Mr. Rath who was the director asked Mr. Saffery to come back into the office as bookkeeper. From that time on he has remained in that department, progressing to his present position as its head.

Mr. Saffery has continued his interest in all kinds of sports. He attends every game he can, and when he visits the mainland goes to outstanding sports events.

He also has a hobby and what might be termed an avocation. He gardens and grows flowers for a hobby, but his avocation is being full time grandfather to three lively granddaughters, ages 6, 3 and 10 months.

At present his son, a graduate of St. Louis College is employed at Pearl Harbor. He, his wife and children are living with Mr. and Mrs. Saffery until their new house is built, and we have a sneaking suspicion that while they are there, Mr. Saffery spends more time on his avocation of grandfather, than on his hobby of raising flowers.

New classes in group piano and voice for adults have started with considerable interest from the Palama community. These take place during the day or evening to suit the convenience of working people.

In addition to the fee-classes there are music activities for children and adults requiring only the small annual membership fee. Included in these are a dramatics club for teen-agers, meeting on Monday nights; a playacting and singing games club for children from seven to thirteen. An adult community chorus meets informally Friday evenings to sing folk songs of many nations and on Saturday nights a Hawaiian instrumental group meets for two hours.



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
