KAKAAKO SONS WIN COMMUNITY VOLLEY TITLE

Coach Tai Loy Ho's mighty Kakaako Sons won their second consecutive Palama Community Volleyball championship by whipping a tough Kakaako outfit 15-13, 15-10 last Thursday, May 25, in the Settlement gym.

The scores fail to indicate the closeness of the tussle, which was easily the greatest yet fought in the Westside gym. Both sextets flashed brilliant volleyball offensively and defensively, and only a slim edge in consistency gained the victory for Kakaako Sons.

Starring for the winners were DeLima, Kapuniae, Wehr, Chang, Kroll, Ho, Kane, and Silva, while Huihui, Carreira, Peterson, Kalani, Shodahl, Kauhana, and Yuen performed well for Kakaako.

The Leaders handed Heoji Kumashiro's defending-champion McInerny Monarchs their second setback of the season and incidentally eliminated them from the titular play-offs by coming through with a brilliant 7-3 triumph. The Leaders gained the driver's seat in "C" Section by virtue of the victory, and have only Billy's Barber Shop to contend with for the division championship.

Ono Loa deadlocked Elders Club for the Section "B" flag by eliminating Kam Heights 11-7 in a great finish. Billy's Barber Shop remained in the picture for a shot at the championship eliminations by nipping Castle Club 10-9. An early lead enabled the Barbers to stave off a spirited Castle rally in the final innings.

Three forfeits and five no-play games marred the scheduled 12-game attraction. Phantom A.C., Yama Tailor, and Elders Club won on defaults from Kaiulani, Rengo Kai, and Akepos respectively, while five tussles were cancelled when opposing teams failed to put on an appearance.
