

Miss Hampton sang and danced her way into the hearts of the audience ably accompanied by her dancing partner. Evelyn Young also made a hit with a special tap number, while Yankoff strutted his wares a la Astaire in spectacular fashion. Mrs. Martha Hohu's flying fingers gave the boys eyefulls of top-notch piano playing.

HONOLULU DENTAL SOCIETY MEETS AT PALAMA

The Honolulu Dental Society spent Saturday, December 5th at the Palama Settlement. The morning was devoted to professional papers in the auditorium, luncheon being served immediately afterward to some 60 members in the Cafeteria, while the afternoon was devoted to clinical demonstrations in the Dental Clinic.

Palama is for tunate to be able to entertain the Dental Society so effectively, one of the many ways Palama serves as a community center and meeting place for public and private organizations.

NURSING DEPARTMENT START NEW PROJECT

The Public Health Nursing Department feels that it has reached a point in its development where it can spread its services of Health Education to other groups in our Community. With this in mind, it is ready to attempt a class in Child Health among a small group of selected fathers. The members of this group have been met through their wives who regularly attend our Baby Conferences, drawn only from the Palama district at the present time.

Although there are several Public Health Nursing agencies carrying on this work on the Mainland, it is a new experience for Honolulu and we are looking forward to it with a great deal of enthusiasm.

The National Organization for Public Health Nursing with headquarters in New York City is aware of these plans and expresses a great deal of interest in it and will watch closely the development of it.

The series of lessons will cover discussion on resources in the Territory for Child Care, Statistics bringing out the Infant Mortality Rate and Causes of Infant Death, Physical Growth and Development, Care and Prevention of Communicable Disease, Prenatal Care, and Mental Hygiene or Good Habits for Children.

We are very appreciative of the Men's and Boys' Recreation Department in offering us the use of a Club room for weekly meetings. Also through Mr. Wood, we have secured the services of a NYA worker from the University of Hawaii.
