Miss Thora G. Kronmann

(1879 - September 11, 1937)

Another of Palama Settlement's beloved staff members have left this world of ours for a Great Adventure. Miss Thora G. Kronmann, pharmacist of the Medical Clinic since 1930, died last Saturday evening, September 11, 1937, at the Tripler General Hospital after a lingering illness of two months. Miss Kronmann was 58 years old and had been a nurse for 25 years.

It was our misfortune to know Miss Kronmann only slightly, but we remember her as a kindly middle-aged woman with a pleasant smile. She performed her duties faithfully, cheerfully, and efficiently until complications arising from cancer forced her to retire on June 12th of this year.

Miss Kronmann exemplified a high type of courage - she wore a smile while living in a world of pain. May God bless her soul:
