## GETTYSBURG ADDRESS

Fourscore and seven years ago, our fathers brought forth upon this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation - or any nation so conceived and so dedicated - can long endure.

We are met on a great battle-field of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting place of those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate, we cannot consecrate, we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember, what we say here; but it can never forget what they did here.

It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here, to the unfinished work that they have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us; that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion; that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain; that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom; and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

#### PAL BUS GOES INTO SERVICE THIS WEEK

The Settlement "carry-all" bus will go into service again this week. The causes of the identical accidents in the past was traced to the type of nuts used on the rear wheels. The following changes have been made:

- 1 New type safety lock-washers and nuts have been installed on the rear wheels making it impossible for similar accidents to occur.
- 2 Six new steel braces have been installed from chassis to the body (3 on each side) to prevent swaying on curves or when heavily loaded on one side.
- 3 A back rest has been added to the center row of seats.
- 4 The insurance company reinsured the bus only after these changes. This fact is our best guarantee of safety. Unless the insurance company was certain of their ground, they would have refused to insure the bus again.
- 5 Extreme care will be used in selection of a driver at all times.
- 6 The bus will be inspected every two weeks by Von Hamm Young & Company.

# PALS WIN AAU CAGE TITLE

Palama Settlement's hard-fighting casaba representatives were crowned 1937 Junior A.A.U. Basketball champions by virtue of a brilliant 37-32 victory over Nuuanu "Y" last Friday evening, February 5th, at the Central YMCA gymnasium. The triumph marked the Pals' fifth win for the season, their only loss being suffered when an inspired Eagle Lodge quintet outshot the winged P snipers 35-28 Wednesday night, February 3rd, in the most spectacular upset registered in a league featured with wholesale booting of the dope pail.

The Westsiders were never headed after Abili and Koo rang the bell in rapid succession early in the game, and at halftime, were on the long end of a 20-16 count. Nuuanu "Y" were within striking distance of the champions through the fine goal tossing of George Lee, believed by many to be the tallest Korean cager in the game. The six-foot six skyscraper tallied the first 14 points for his red-jer-seyed mates, but was stopped in the second half by the superb guarding of Sylvester Abili. Palama swished the nets for 13 straight markers immediately after the third quarter opened as James Koo went on a one-man rampage. However, the Nuuanu lads retaliated in brilliant fashion in the last period, and it was only the great ball handling of the Westsiders that insured the victory and championship for them. Koo connected for 12 of his team's score, and was ably paced by Elliot Smith and Abili with 8 and 7 digits respectively. Akamine, Meyer, Tomita, Ahana, and Kaya also scintilated for the Maroons.

Every Pal victory was hard earned. Basketball fans will not soon forget their sweeping rallies in the Citywide and Dragon games when everything seemed lost, nor will the "money" playing of Francis Sing, Francis Meyer, and Sylvester Abili fail to gain recognition whenever and wherever lovers of the great indoor sport gather. The winged P crew first covered themselves with glory and established reputations as fighters of the highest magnitude when they stopped Citywide 42-32 in an overtime tilt. Central "Y" fell a comparatively easy victim 36-27 in the Pals' next showing. The Westsiders staged a magnificent comeback after trailing 20-6 to clip the Dragons 29-27. St. Patrick A.C. traded basket for basket with Palama until Francis Sing took matters into his own hands to give the Settlement a 24-22 victory, their fourth in a row. Eagle Lodge scored a sensational 35-28 upset to stop the Maroon winning streak, but the winged P basketeers repelled Nuuanu YMCA to annex the hotly-contested title.
