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PAL SUMMER (RAFT-CLASS SWIM MEET Tues. Aug. 16, 1938

Eight events will be run off at the Summer Craft Class swinming meet Tuesday, August 16, at 7 pm. in our tank.

This meet is being held to give the younger boys a chance to get into competition. Only boys 14 years and under may swim in this The older boys this time will sit on the sidelines.

Each craft class may have only two men in each event(except in the relay), but an individual is not limited in the number of events in which he may compete. Entries close on Saturday, August 13th at 4 pm

A craft class member may sign up and swim for only one class. Any regularly registered Palama member in the class is eligible. No subsititutions will be permitted in the individual events. The points system will be 5-3-2-1 for individual events and 10-6-4-2 for the relays.

Entries that have been turned in so far have lined up an array of first class swimmers . No doubt quite a number of good swimmers will be uncovered.

The 8 events lined up so far are: 25 & 50 Yds. freestyles, 25 & 50 Yds. Breastrokes, 25 & 50 Yds. Backstrokes, 25 & 50 Yds. freestyle relays.
