NINTH TUBERCULOSIS CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE BEGINS NOVEMBER 17



The ninth annual Christmas Seal Sale of the Tuberculosis Association, with headquarters at Palama Settlement, will begin this Friday, November 17, and continue until Christmas.

Funds will finance a year-round program in tuberculosis prevention and education. Expansion of the sheltered workshop for former tuberculosis patients is now being planned.

Rockwell Kent, American artist, writer, and lecturer, is the designer of this year's Christmas Seal. "Protect Your Home From Tuberculosis" is the theme of this year's campaign. As a symbol of that protection, Mr. Kent has used an angel with outstretched arm. Against a brilliant blue background, the double-barred cross, international symbol of the fight against tuberculosis, is prominently displayed.

Rockwell Kent was born in Tarrytown Heights, New York, in 1888, and has lived in Newfoundland, in Greenland, and in Alaska. Many of his pictures portray aspects of life among the Eskimos and the Northern Indians. As a side-line, he raises pure-breed Jersey cattle and Great Dane dogs at his farm in upper New York State.

PIRATES "B" WIN 110# CAGE CHAMPIONSHIP

Tommy Wong's classy Pirates "B" cage outfit won the 1939 Palama 110# basket-ball championship by walloping Castle A. C. 20-13 last Tuesday evening, November 7, in the Westside gym. The victory was the Pirates' eighth in a row against no losses and officially closed the season.

Given Goo sparked the Pirates' win by chalking up 12 points from a forward post, and performing brilliantly on the floor. Pang, Wee, Chock, and Young contributed to the victory by tallying one basket each. Yamaguchi, with four markers, was Castle's big gun. Okamoto and Kinumatsu scored three digits apiece.

Raymond Choo's Hui Aliis staged a brilliant comeback after early season setbacks to rush into second place behind the Pirates. The Aliis sported a seasonal record of six victories and two losses. The remainder of the nine-team field were strung along far back of the two leading teams. Biggest disappointment of the league was the dismal showing made by the defending-champion B. K. Yamamoto outfit, which folded up following a defeat by the Hui Aliis.

Last year, an all-star quintet was selected at the end of the season, but with the wholesale amount of forfeits registered in the 1939 league, the practice has been continued. The Pirates and Hui Alii, incidentally, would have landed the majority of berths.

Honolulu Vocation School opened the circuit by dumping McInerny 22-9 to lower the mantle upon the Monarchs as perennial title contenders. Castle A.C. and Alex Sandwich Shop displayed power galore in running up lopsided victories. Castle swamped Kaahumanu 39-9 while the Sandwich Shop crushed Elfs A.C. 43-17.

Petrowich paced Abell's Crusaders in toppling the heavily-favored Pirates by bagging eight points. Kim, Perreira, and Oh gave him fine support in punishing the Pirate basket. Young, Chong, Ayau, and Lee of the Pirates played their hearts out, but could not match the consistency of the Crusaders, and were forced to bow after a sizzling battle.
